General and General-Governor of Ireland.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

That we respectfully submit to your Excellency the propriety of adopting immediate measures to provide for the employment of the people, in the coming months of scarcity, with which we are so awfully menaced by the unquestionable failure in the potato crop.

That we believe such could not be more effectively achieved than, among other necessaries, by facilitating the progress of the several Irish railway projects about being brought under the consideration of Parliament. That such would be materially promoted by the

establishment of some tribunal in Dublin, which could adequately discharge the functions of select committees of the House of Commons.

That by such a course, those railways would be in progress of execution early in the summer months, when the pressure of distress shall commence.

We also respectfully suggest that, in so doing your Excellency would save those companies, and ultimately the public, heavy and unnecessary expense, and would secure to the country its capital, and its professional ranks, a just proportion of the national expen-

We also beg leave to submit to your Excellency, in furtherance of the important object stated, the relie of the people by remunerative employment, the urgen necessity which exists for such amendments in the Drainage enactment, as shall facilitate and secure it more general introduction.

We trust that your Excellency will recommend to her Majesty's Government the adoption of suggestions equitable in their character, calculated to meet the me nacing evil by which we are threatened, and sanctione by the concurrence of all parties.
