Officers of the 40th (just arrived from India) who will be placed on half-pay on the 1st of April.—Lieut. Colonel Hibbert, Lieuts. Dawson, Nelson, Snelling, D'Brien, and Queade, Dr. Brummell.

Col. Baumgardt, 2d Queen's Regt has arrived in London, and had an interview with the Duke of Wellington on Tuesday. There is no successor yet appointed to Col. Gurwood, Deputy Governor Tower, London.

The following Officers of the 2d, or Queen's, will be placed on half-pay on the 1st March, being over the number required for home service:—Lieut.-Col. Brough, Lieuts. Webb, King, Gildea, Leader, and Gillespie, Jr. Jopp. Lieut.-Col. Brough (brother of Capt. Brough, of the 83d, in this garrison,) entered the Army in 1807, and has constantly been on service.

Lieut. Reynolds, 2d or Queen's, succeeds to an Unattached Captaincy, on Capt. Carney retiring on full pay. Lieut. Wingate obtains a company without purchase.

Three companies of the 2d Queen's, under Brevet Major Jones, are detached from Chichester to Arundel. Mr. William Charles Lane Ryves, second son of Messrs Ryves, Esq. of New Garden, in this county, is appointed to a Cadetship in the Hon. East India Company service.

Accounts from St. Vincent left the 85th Light Infantry good health on the 10th January, with the exception Captain Cope, who was dangerously ill. The Regt. expected to embark in a few days, for Cork, in the Java. A soldier of the 85th was murdered by six black privates of the West India Regiment, at St. Lucia, on Christmas day.

Charges are preferred to the Horse Guards, by a medical gentleman against a Cavalry officer, which will lead to a court-martial.

John Ryan, a deserter from the 74th Regt. was arrested on Wednesday, by Constable Dunlop, and committed to the City gaol.

In the military circles it is stated that four corps of infantry, two of Cavalry, two battalions of the Guards, and four batteries of Artillery will shortly move to India.

Brevet-Major Hill, of the 54th Regiment, is about to ring on full pay, having served much over the prescribed period, and the greater part of the service in a tropical climate. His commissions bear date: Lieut. 12th May, 1814; Lieutenant, 26th Nov. 1821; Major, 5th Jan. 1826; and Brevet-Major, 23d Nov. 1831, and was Adjutant of the Regiment during the Peninsular war, where this Corps and the 44th suffered to an awful extent, by fever and cholera.

Surgeon Semple, of Dublin, has been appointed by the Earl of Beshborough, Lord Lieutenant of the county, to the Surgeonship of the Kilkenny Militia, in the room of Dr. Boyton, deceased. James McIntyre, Esq. to be Major; Walter Butler, Esq. to be Captain; William Sham Candler, Esq. to be Captain; John Otway, Esq. to be Lieutenant; Richard Wheeler, Esq. to be Lieutenant.

Doctor Halpin is appointed Surgeon to the Cavalry.

The late Rear-Admiral Edward S. Clay entered the service in 1783. Was Lieut. of the Venerable, at the glorious victory obtained by Lord Duncan, over the French fleet off Camperdown, in 1797, when he was severely wounded in the engagement, and for which he received the annual pension of £300. At the expedition to the Helder, he was also actively employed, and in 1801, he commanded the Zebra bomb vessel, at the capture of the Danish fleet at Copenhagen. His commission was dated, Lieut. March 19, 1794; Commander, November 3, 1799; Captain, April 29, 1803. and Rear-Admiral (on retirement) Jan. 10, 1837.

Now gentlemen, in this case, the notice was served by the company the 24th last September, requiring the houses and lands at Ballysimon, No. 2, 4, 5, and the lands of Miltown No. 2, 3, 4, 5, 17—there is a small detached portion of Ballysimon about 3 acres of No. 5 let to Shaughnessy, carpenter, for his life, he (Mr. D.) built a capital house on this small division for him, which the company require to pull down, and so anxious were they to lay hold of possession by any means, that they agreed to give this poor man £135. He (Mr. D.) served notice on them last October, that this house was built by him, and that he valued it and the few perches of land on which it stood at £300. Does this company now mean to say that this £300 was demanded for all the property required by their notice of September 1845? If not, then their claim under this 85th sec. falls to the ground. Gentlemen, this poor tenant was so much elated with the idea of thus pocketing the price of this house and property, that he neglected his business, came every day into Limerick looking for his money, and drinking, till the poor man fell into the river and was drowned, thus, this portion of the property was evidently worth £135 more than when the notice was served last October; but, independent of this, the Company now seek to fall back upon this abandoned notice of 4 months, which they long since waived, and you will be surprised Gentlemen to hear that in place of acting upon it, they served notice, and actually proceeded to a Jury last January, where they were defeated, and shall be again. They have lain by ever since their defeat, until some new light broke in upon them, and they now seek your aid to assist them, in as gross and illegal an attempt as was ever witnessed—a proceeding he would not believe to be sanctioned by their Counsel. He was well aware of the means by which they had carried some of their illegal and fabricated documents; even yesterday, that honest Surveyor, Collins, was told he should get a good employment from the Company, and not be so active in his (Mr. Dickson's) service! Is this the way justice is to be defeated here? Gentlemen you have no jurisdiction, and you are called upon to dismiss this most unjust and illegal attempt to defeat the ends of justice.

The Magistrates after consulting together could not understand the law and therefore postponed it to the Assizes.

The following letter has been received by Doctor Griffin, of Kilkree, in reply to a memorial to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant from the respectable inhabitants of the district, of all parties, earnestly calling his Excellency's attention to the increasing distress of the people in that locality, and urging the necessity of taking immediate steps to avert the impending famine:—

Dublin Castle, 20th January, 1846.  
SIR—In acknowledging the receipt of your letter of the 7th instant, enclosing a memorial from certain magistrates, clergy, gentry, and inhabitants of Kilkree, and the surrounding district respecting the failure in the Potato crop. I am directed by the Lord Lieutenant to state that his Excellency bears with deep regret that such a scarcity of food, as is described in the memorial forwarded by you, exists in the district of Kilkree, and his Excellency has directed that your communication and enclosure be transmitted to the Commissioners for enquiry into all matters relating to the failure of the Potato crop, for their consideration.
