THE COMMITTEE of the above Society regret to state that the Funds of this valuable Institution, not only completely exhausted, but considerably overdrawn; and unless additional Funds are immediately procured at their disposal, they will feel themselves called upon, permanently, to close the Establishment. TO THE EDITOR OF

Ballymoro, 24th February, 1846.
Newmarket on-Fergus.

—I will feel obliged by your inserting the following unprecedented act of generosity in to-morrow's Number of your widely circulating and independent Paper:—

I hold here, where I am living, 49 Acres of the prime land in this county, from JOHN RIGGS MILLER, of London, at £2 per acre, on which I built a house and for which Mr. MILLER liberally allowed me 4 years since. I wrote to him a fortnight ago, saying I hoped he would give me some further allowance, so letting him know that I got my Farm surveyed, that it turned out but 47 acres, and 2 roods, and asking he would order another survey of it, to ascertain if my survey was correct. On Saturday last, I received a letter from him from London, in which he says I think you are entitled to further compensation, and will now give you £100, and I will do more than that for you, though you did not ask me—I will give you a new lease of your farm at 35s. an acre, and I will assume the farm to contain, commencing from the 1st of May, 1845, 47 acres, instead of 49. He ordered a survey of it, but took it on my own account, and reduced it two roods more than I had. I declare most solemnly, I never asked him for any abatement. I would not have a face to ask him, and I had the farm under its value; nor was he, in any respect, either by promise or otherwise, bound to give me any shilling allowance towards the building of a house. I consider I would be guilty of a great wrong, were I not to proclaim this benevolent act, and to let the world know what a noble mind this kind-hearted gentleman must possess. As your Paper has such a wide circulation, I have taken the liberty of selecting a few lines to give this exceedingly kind act as publicity as possible. Hoping you will excuse me for trespassing so much on you.
