

to establish a new tribunal, never contemplated by the Legislature, to remedy the many defects of the present proceedings.

6th section, upon which they so much rely, is very plain, and very simple and just, if justly construed, as intended by Parliament, and not perverted to purposes never thought of. This might deal with the owners by private agreement, the parties might consent to arbitration, but then they should go to a jury. The 58th section very properly provides, in case of a party who after diligent enquiry could not be found, then the compensation should be determined by such surveyor as two justices should appoint, and the 59th section, upon such proof that the party could not be found, empowers two Magistrates to nominate a surveyor; then comes this 85th section, which he contended, clearly and manifestly, gave power whatever to Justices to appoint a surveyor. If a surveyor was to be appointed, it was under the said 58th and 59th sections, which would not apply at all, as they would not, he supposed, obtain that he was absent, and could not be found, and that this 85th section applied merely to two Justices. Where the party claimed a sum of money which was thought too much—but in order to prevent the money being deposited in bank the entire amount so claimed and performed some other requisites until the amount should be ascertained. The 2d case is in reference to sections 58 and 59, viz. that the party should deposit such sum, as stated by a surveyor appointed by 2 Justices, in manner before mentioned, in case of parties who could not be found. It is manifest that this 85th section gave no power whatever to justices to appoint a surveyor, but referred to a surveyor, to be appointed in manner provided, under the 58th and 59th sections? He asked, then, what jurisdiction had they at all thus to deprive him, by a short and summary proceeding, of his property? He also maintained that even if this party had rights, under the 85th section, they should have lodged the money, and performed the requisites therein, before any jurisdiction was exercised. Mr. Delmege thought otherwise, and that as the party had claimed, the amount could not be lodged. The respondent replied, that this very fact left them no jurisdiction at all—that depositing the sum claimed was not a waiver of their jurisdiction.

Mr. Delmege thought this 85th section gave the party a power in same manner, as the 58th and 59th sections, and declared his wish to do Mr. Dickson justice possible, and stated what he thought was in his interest, but Mr. Dickson requested he would mind him at all therein, but mind the law—was unable to protect himself and his rights, and would do so. He stated that those proceedings appeared every day the more extraordinary, and on the 13th, pending the adjournment of the Court, he was served with a notice of application, in this very case, which is clearly a waiver of his right of novelty, and Mr. O'Farrell told them he would proceed upon it during the Tralee Assizes, and would give their first notice, so long ago as the 24th Sept. He having proceeded to a jury, and being defeated, he sought to pervert this plain and fair 85th section to effect, by illegal means, what they have done, and he is able to do legally, and they expect to get the assistance of the petty magistrates to aid them in such a proceeding.

He finally agreed that Mr. Henn should be appointed assessor, and the case was adjourned to Tuesday.
