The Earl of Glengall has become a President, and Sir John Macneill a Vice-President, of the Society for the Improvement of Ireland.

Mr. Griffiths, of the Board of Works, accompanied by S. E. De Vere, and V. E. De Vere, Esqrs, arrived in Pallaskenry, after inspecting the new line of road from Pallas to the Limerick road, and supplied the committee with queries, relative to land and labour in each parish, which are to be answered and transmitted to Government.

At a meeting of the Arcanny and Chapel Russell relief committee, Thomas Hill, Esq. in the chair, Mr. A. Morris was deputed to purchase in this city two ton of Indian corn meal, to relieve the local distress, and the treasurer, Rev. Mr. Green, paid £24 for the purchase.

Mr. Daly has succeeded as Commissioner of the affairs of Lunatics, on the elevation of Mr. James Dwyer to the station of Queen's Counsel.

Bolton Waller, Esq. of Shannongrove-house, has new potatoes fit for table at this early season.

The Great Southern and Western extension to Cork company have agreed with Cooper Penrose, Esq. for the purchase of a lot of ground from Lecky and Co.'s ship-yard to Hargrave's-quay, Cork, for the terminus and floating docks. The amount is 22,000 guineas.

Counsellor Corballis succeeds the late Mr. Clarke as Attorney-General of the Home circuit. Mr. Grattan Curran is likely to be made permanent as Prosecuting Queen's Counsel on that circuit.

Three countrymen returning from market on Wednesday evening, were attacked and desperately beaten a mile outside the Blackboy turnpike. They were conveyed to the County Infirmary, where they remain under the care of Dr. Gelston.

John Joye was waylaid and murdered at Cooga, between Doone and Cappamore, on Sunday night, after quitting a public house. James Bennett, Esq. coroner, held an inquest on the body ; verdict of wilful murder against Thomas Richardson, of Doone, and John Quinlan, who have absconded. Deceased was a wood-ranger on Lord Stanley's property.

It was Constable Phillips, of the Bunkey station, late of the city police, who arrested eight men, for having waylaid and grossly assaulted James Doherty, last month, as detailed in our columns of the 25th, and who has since died of his wounds. He also arrested William Ryan, who had been on the run eight months, charged on oath, with having attacked the house of Henry M'Keogh, of Bunkey, near Castle-Connell.

Tuesday night, a house, the property of James Kennedy, at Sallymount, near Annacotty, was maliciously burned to the ground. The inmates had an almost miraculous escape from being burned to death. The cause assigned for this outrage is, that Kennedy and his daughter are suspected of giving information to the police of the parties who fired at the Rev. Mr. Westropp near Kilmurry. Kennedy is a strictly honest man, but the disaffected vowed vengeance against his family.
