

The Rev. John Wall, of Kilgobinet, Waterford, who died on Thursday in his 74th year, was 24 years Curate of the above place, and never obtained a parish for his labours in the R. C. Church.

The Rev. T. O'Malley left Dublin yesterday for London, to give evidence before the committee of the House of Lords, appointed to inquire into the working of the poor law in Ireland, of which the Earl Clancarty is chairman.

The Rev. Peter Daly, P.P. founder of the Galway Magdalen Asylum, in 1822, has informed the Right Rev. Dr. M'Hale, that he recently purchased the iron beds at the Police barracks, for the accommodation of penitents in the former asylum, but none of this unfortunate outcast class are yet admitted for reformation.

The Magdalen Asylum, Cork, is to be transferred to the Sisters of Charity.

Much dissatisfaction is felt by landlords and farmers in the district, at a Roman Catholic Clergyman near Clonmoney, county Clare, directing the peasantry, from the altar, not to sow potatoes this year. Should this wild precept be acted upon, there will be a far greater scarcity of provisions next year, and more grievous loss, than is apprehended at present.

CORONER'S INQUEST—INHUMAN CONDUCT.

A SWEEP ROASTED ALIVE!

An inquest was held on Sunday, at Barringtons' Hospital, on the body of Michael O'Brien, a chimney sweep, aged eight years, who was burned to death in the flue of a chimney in Patrick-street, on Saturday evening, which he was forced to descend by his master, Michael Sullivan, although the chimney had been on fire since early in the afternoon. The body of the unfortunate creature presented an awful appearance, being literally roasted and mangled. We subjoin the evidence of the witnesses, which will speak for itself:—

Thomas Costelloe, of Garryowen, labourer, deposed, that he was in Mr. Matthew Ryan's house, in Patrick-street, on Saturday evening, where he saw two sweeps, Michael Sullivan (master) and Michael O'Brien (apprentice) aged eight years; was present when Sullivan compelled the climbing boy to ascend the chimney; shortly after being sent up, the boy cried out, he was burning, and Sullivan called him down; Sullivan then brought the boy up to the top of the house, and directed him to go down through the chimney, which he did; in about two hours after, witness saw Michael O'Brien taken out of the chimney dead; deceased had objected to go down the chimney, upon which Sullivan seized him by the arms, and forced him up stairs; heard Mr. Ryan desire Sullivan not to send the boy up the chimney, if there was any danger.

Catherine Ryan, servant in the house, sworn—I heard Sullivan desire the little boy go up Mr. Ryan's chimney, for the purpose of cleaning it; in about 15 minutes after, I heard the boy cry in the flue, and say he was burning; he then came down the chimney, and Sullivan caught hold of him by the leg, and pulled him into the grate of the fire-place; he beat the boy with a leather belt so severely, that the little fellow threw himself on his knees, and said, "I will go to the top of the house, and come down through the chimney;" I saw Sullivan seize him by the arm, and carry him up stairs to the top of the house; the boy was subsequently taken out of the chimney dead.

The jury returned the following verdict:—"Michael O'Brien came by his death from the effects of heat and suffocation, in consequence of having been forced to descend a chimney in Mr. Ryan's house, Patrick-street, by Michael Sullivan."

The monster, who was the cause of the boy's death, has absconded.

The Shannon Commissioners having completed their improvement of the Shannon, so far as its junction with the Grand Canal at Shannon-Harbour, the Dublin Steam Company this week avail themselves of the improved state of the navigation, by sending up daily a large steamer to Shannon Harbour, and having a second steamer to start from that place immediately on the arrival of the Grand Canal Company's night packet. The Dublin Company also propose extending, as soon as the improvements of the river shall have been completed to Athlone, their large steamers to that important town—thus effecting a daily communication between Athlone and Limerick.

The Marquis Conyngham has instructed Marcus Kean, Esq., to pay £30 each to the Killone and Cooreclare relief committees, £15 to Corofin, £40 to Drumcliff and Kilmally, and £50 to other relief committees. His Lordship has also directed that £100 should be paid towards making a public walk and parapet round Killee bay, in case of this improvement being undertaken by the Board of Works.

At a special session under the 1st of Victoria, at Spencilhill, £2500 was passed for completing the road from Gore's bridge, Ennis, through the bog of Doora.

Lord Cloncurry has sent £10 to the Carrigaholt relief fund.—His Lordship is uncle to the lord of the soil, Mr. Burton, D.L.

Lieut.-Colonel Stokes, of the East India Company service, has subscribed £30 to the Tralee relief fund.

Of the £3000 remitted from Calcutta, to relieve the destitute poor in Ireland, only £30 has been allocated at the first meeting of the Dublin committee, the Duke of Leinster in the chair, and that was to Arran, on the Galway coast.

Nicholas Westby, Esq., has paid £30 to the Relief Committee of Carrigaholt, £30 to Kilmally, £20 to Kilrush, £15 to Corofin, and £10 each to Crusheen, Scariff, Kilmihil, Ennistimon and Cooraclare.

In Mallow workhouse the paupers rose up against the India meal food, and the police were called in to protect the officers of the house.

Five runaway boys from the Cork workhouse, who absconded with property of the guardians, were sentenced by the Recorder to imprisonment, hard labour, and whipping.

Miss Rigney (sister to the Rev. John Rigney, of the Australian Mission) is appointed assistant school mistress to the Ballinasloe workhouse, vacant by the resignation of Miss M'Sweeny.

A conditional order for criminal information is granted in Denroche Purcell v. J. Hallinan, where the plaintiff, owner of a pack of harriers in Cork, complained of defendant, who resides at Charleville, for coursing with grey-hounds in the vicinity of the former, and the latter subsequently sent a hostile letter.

Last week £19,000 quarters of wheat, and 20,000 brls. of flour were landed in London, for bond.

Mr. D. M'Gillicuddy is appointed secretary to the Tralee poor relief committee at 25s. per week salary.
