Sir Aubrey, early in life, studied books and men, in the closet and in the world. Though not a professed author, those few literary productions he sent to press, fully establish his title to considerable erudition and very elegant taste. Some of his poetry may rank with the best classic pieces in modern English literature. Aubrey De Vere was only son of the late Sir Vere Hunt, who sat in the Irish Parliament, nephew of the late Earl of Limerick, and brother-in-law of Lord Monteagle.
