Quin Relief Committee.

At a full Meeting of this Committee, held on the 11th August, JOHN SINGLETON, Esq., in the Chair, it was resolved unanimously,

That the members of this Committee cannot but bri their labours to a close without recording their sense of gratitude so justly due to her Majesty's late Minister and his colleagues, for the foresight and statesmanlike policy by which their measures were guided in reference to the impending famine that fearfully hung over this portion of the British dominions, together with their full conviction; that had Robert Peel yielded to the opposition and the taunts with which his pictures of Irish destitution were the additional horrors inseparable from misery and despair must inevitably have flowed throughout the tire of this extensive County.

That our sincere thanks are eminently due, hereby tendered to the late Lord Lieutenant of the land, for the promptitude and humanity with which all the means placed at his disposal were so successfully carried out for the mitigation of the wide-spread distress with which our county was visited, and like to Mr. Pennycuik, for the courtesy and ability with which he distinguished the exercise of the onerous duties imposed upon him in addition to his ordinary functions as a member of the Irish Government.

That, the anxious solicitude on the part of the of Lincoln, for the alleviation of the distress with which it pleased Providence to afflict this country—as evinced during the short period of his connection therewith entitles him to the everlasting gratitude of Irish and in an especial manner for the generous sentiments which concluded his reply to the County Limerick Jury, in which his Lordship announces his intention of continuing to look upon the amelioration of the condition of the Irish people as one of the noblest to which a British Legislator can devote himself.

SIR—I have received with very great pleasure your letter of the 11th instant, enclosing Resolutions passed at a meeting of the Quin Relief Committee which you are the Chairman.

The satisfaction with which as a member of Majesty's late Government, I accept this as proof of the grateful feeling with which all classes in Ireland have appreciated the earnest efforts which Government made to avert from the poor country the severe distress which was threatened by the loss of their usual food, is alloyed only by the intelligence that it has again pleased Providence to inflict a similar visitation upon the country. I hope that out of this temporary, though heavy trial, great eventual good may arise to Ireland and improved condition of her people. To elicit this should be the anxious aim, not only of Government and Legislatures, but of those whose residence in the country, and connection with it by property there the fitting instruments of so hallowed a duty.
