Mr. Joseph Myles is forwarding 100 tons of Indian meal, purchased for the Killarney Relief Committee.

Friday evening as some cars laden with oatmeal, the property of Mr. Fras. John O'Neill, were passing through on their way from Rockvale mills, Newport, to this city, a large crowd surrounded the cars and turned the horses back, declaring they would allow no food to leave the country whilst they were starving, but upon being remonstrated with by Mr. Lee, of Barna, the cars, after considerable delay, were allowed to proceed to their destination.

Three horses left Deerpark with corn for Limerick, and after disposing of it, Mr. E. Maunsell gave directions to have two of them left at Meelick, for the purpose of drawing hay, when the third returning, was shot near Bunratty, at 8 o'clock in the evening, by three men, without saying a word. Mr. Maunsell was not present.

An inquest was held at Adare, on Monday, before John Cox, Esq. coroner, on the body of Margaret Sullivan, aged seven years, who was found in the Mague, it appeared from the evidence she accidentally fell in. Dr. George Mackay examined the body. Verdict, accidental death.

On Saturday, four bailiffs, employed by Pat Condon, under agent to William Hill, Esq. of Doneraile, went to the lands of a man named Michael O'Brien, near Castletown, county Tipperary, to distrain sheep for rent due to Mr. Hill. After making the seizure, several persons collected, and rescued the sheep. Michael O'Brien received a blow on the head with a loaded butt, which inflicted a severe wound.

Sunday morning, at a very early hour, a party of armed men went to the house of Pat Punfield, and fired a shot through the kitchen window, which shattered it, and lodged in the opposite wall. They then fired two shots outside the house, at a dog, which killed him. They then went into a field adjoining the house, and fired at a mare worth £20, and lodged the contents in her flank. The mare is the property of the above Pat Condon, and Bunfield is his brother-in-law.

On Sunday last, four armed men went to the residence of Edward Kayes, at Gerawn, and demanded his fire-arms. Kayes refused to give them up, when one of the party snapped a pistol twice at him, which did not go off. They then struck him a blow on the head, which did not prevent him running out for assistance.

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
