**LIMERICK UNION.**—A special meeting of Guardians was held to-day to consider the state of the workhouse, where the Board have to prove of the course adopted in the course of the year, showing £3000 from the National Loan, which the Manager has to account for to the clerk was instructed forthwith to prepare the preliminary returns for striking a balance through before the 1st of the month, and were also made to provide a plan for the establishment for 449 paupers in the house this day, 1853.
