DEATHS

At the Parsonage House, Danboe, on Wednesday last, the 25th ult the Venerable Thomas Bewley Mousell, Archdeacon of Kerry, and Precentor of Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin. With unfeigned regret we record this event, which will spread a gloom over the Church of Ireland, and over this diocese in particular, in which he ministered for more than thirty years, for twenty of which he filled the office of Archdeacon. The qualities of his mind and heart were of no ordinary stamp. To the most unyielding integrity he united the kindest heart; firmness of purpose, and a fearless independence of spirit were blended in his character with a rare humility. All were consecrated to the sacred cause of religion, to which he devoted all his energies. The foremost in every good work himself, he carried with him, by his zeal, his example, and his elevated position, the respect and co-operation not only of his brethren in the Ministry, but of the lay gentry who appreciated his worth. His illness, which was but of a week's duration, was occasioned by his great exertions in administering to the temporal and spiritual wants of his parishioners. Of him it may be of a truth affirmed—"To him to live was Christ, and to die was gain."
