Eight deaths from starvation have occurred in the
County Mayo in one week!! In the neighbourhood of
Turlough, a poor man named Francis Bradley, died
last week of starvation. A poor woman named Walsh,
also died from hunger. She was feeble and unable to
work. Mr. Atkinson, coroner, held an inquest at
