him to Bury, Lancashire, and he went to the barracks,
and demanded to be admitted to the Major. The
sentinel on duty refused to allow him to pass—but
reported the circumstance to his superior officer. Mr.
Mundell producing a brace of pistols, exclaimed, "I
will have my revenge of the Major before I leave."
Major Blackburn went to a magistrate, and exhibited
articles of the peace against Mr. Mundell. A warrant
was issued, and the police arrested the officer, who
subsequently attempted to escape by jumping out of
the window, a height of twenty feet from the ground,
but was fortunately prevented. Thursday last he was
required to enter into his own recognizance in £200,
and two sureties in £100 each. In default of the securities
the prisoner was committed to Salford gaol.

THE LATE CAPT. STACKPOOLE, R.N.—The sudden
death, on Tuesday evening last, of this lamented gentle-
man, has plunged a large circle of relatives and friends
into the deepest affliction. He walked from Milford
into Limerick the day upon which his death occurred,
and at dinner was in good spirits and apparently quite
well. When about to cut some cheese, his hand was
observed to fall, and on being asked if any thing was
the matter, he motioned for a pen and ink; but when
it was brought, he was unable to use it. Dr. Gore and
Dr. John Russell were immediately sent for, who found
on arrival that he was fast sinking from apoplexy,
caused by the rupture of a blood vessel in the head.—
In less than an hour and a-half from the commence-
ment of the attack he was numbered amongst the dead.
Few men lived more beloved and respected, few acted
more kindly, or with a higher sense of honour and
religious duty, than this amiable man. His private
charity was extensive when he knew it to be needed.—
He was a most indulgent landlord to a numerous
tenantry; and he never failed, morning or evening, in
his family, to discharge with a pious feeling, his religious
duties to his God. His loss will be deeply felt in many
private circles, where his generosity contributed to the
comfort of those who required his aid—and his memory
will ever be cherished with affection and respect.
