The uniform support of its friends has enabled the  
Magdalen Asylum to contend successfully with many,  
and severe trials, during a period of forty-five years.  
The present alarming crisis is obviously fraught with  
difficulties and dangers, which, without the cordial co-  
operation of the Citizens of Limerick, it cannot hope  
to surmount.

To whom shall these Friendless Females, the neglected  
of society, fly for refuge in their distress, but to the  
charity of their Fellow Citizens? The misfortunes of  
many of them are the result of death, which deprived  
them in early life of the natural protection of a Father  
or of a Friend; the misfortunes of others are the result  
of those reverses in life from which no station in  
society is secure; but the misfortunes of most of them  
are the consequences of that Staring Poverty which  
constitutes so fearful a feature in the present aspect of  
society. Could their unhappy career be traced to its  
source, we should probably find that if in early life we  
had relieved their distress, we would have prevented  
all their subsequent misfortunes.

The present Appeal is made at a period when the  
cries of the poor find a ready response in the bosom of  
every Christian. The cold garret, the noisome cellar,  
and the damp cabin, are cheered by the active charity  
of these merciful times—but the cheer of the Penitent  
Magdalen is the bread of sorrow, and her feast the cup  
of tears. In the Convict ship she would cost the Public  
£13, in a Felons' Jail £11, in the Union Workhouse £6;  
thrown upon the world she would, perhaps, provide  
herself by plunder; in the Magdalen Asylum she is  
clothed, fed, instructed, and receives the care of a  
daughter from the excellent lady who superintends that  
Establishment, at a cost to the Public of £2 a year.

All these claims are greatly enhanced to the Citizens  
of Limerick by the advocacy, upon the present occasion,  
of the Venerable Rector of Clongowes College, the  
Representative, in this country, of a body of men to  
whom Religion, Science, and Literature are more  
deeply indebted, than to any other society, sacred or  
secular, which occupies a place in the history of the  
last three hundred years.

Donations of those who cannot attend will be thank-  
fully received by the Right Rev. Dr. Ryan, the Very  
Rev. Preacher, by the Clergymen of the City, and by  
the Rev. J. Stokes, Chaplain to the Asylum.
