Mr. Smyth, of Ballynatray, has given up his pack
 hounds, in consequence of the pressure on the poor,
 in praiseworthy determination of not feeding animals,
 during this unprecedented scarcity, with the food
 destined for human beings.

The Lord Chancellor has appointed David Cagney,
 Parkgariffa, Esq., to the Commission of the Peace
 for the County Cork.

At the City Cork ordinary presentment sessions this
 week, £1400 was presented for the gaol board of super-
 endance, and £1000 for the fever hospital.

The capital of the Cork Annuity Society will be
 £20,000 in May next, and the increase of last year was
 £300, when 104 annuitants had received the benefit
 of the institution.

There are at present in the workhouse of Skibbereen,
 five thousand inmates; of these there are 136 in the
 fever hospital, and 120 in the infirmary. Applicants
 at the lodge door while soliciting admission; they
 pile on the roads while staggering towards the work-
 house. On the last board day one poor wretch dropped
 dead whilst standing at the gate, and another breathed
 his last a few minutes after his entrance.

The number of deaths in the Scariff workhouse,
 arising from fever, amounts to a frightful extent, while
 the Ennistymon establishment has been so over-populated
 that disease was generated, and many paupers have
 taken refuge in the Ennis, from the Ennistymon Fever
 hospital.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.
 DEAR SIR—Will you be good enough to give me a
 place in your valuable Paper for the following letter:—
 In reading the CHRONICLE of Wednesday last, I per-
 ceived a statement, or rather a misstatement, in it,
 which regarded me, namely, as follows:—
 "As Mr. Dawson Hunt's labourers were ploughing
 the lands at Odelville, near Ballygarry, held by Mr.
 Daniel D. Power, they were attacked by a well-armed
 party, and driven from the lands." Now, Sir, I beg
 to state the facts, as in justice to me should have been
 done in the first instance. I served a notice of sur-
 render of these lands last September, to give up same
 on the ensuing 25th of March; and Mr. Hunt then
 became the tenant, but having heard that he became
 obnoxious to some people for so doing, and received
 several notices to abandon same, I then stepped forward
 to support him by all the means in my power, and in
 the first instance, I gave him permission to till the
 lands, which were mine until the 25th of March; and
 secondly, I sent him all my ploughs to aid him in the
 tilling of his wheat, merely to show the public I had
 no ill will to Mr. H. for taking those lands, and to
 countenance such misguided legislation; and further,
 stated, that under any circumstances, it was not my
 intention to continue a tenancy longer than the above-
 named period. All I did to reconcile matters as I con-
 sidered right, and notwithstanding all I did, I feel rather
 grieved at the stigma attached to me by the nature of the paragraph
 in your last CHRONICLE; and whoever sent you same
 insertion, must have done so willingly, to cast
 a slur on my character, as if not, they ought, in the
 first instance, to state, I surrendered the lands, and did
 so in my power to check and discountenance the pro-
 ceedings from the commencement.

I beg to apologise for this lengthened statement and
 intrusion on your valuable time and paper, but in
 justice to my character, I feel I am bound to refute any
 insinuation, as in my mind was attempted by the
 nature of the erroneous statement on Wednesday.
