LIGHT WEIGHTS.—Messrs. Wilkinson and Hickie, Inspectors of Markets under the Corporation, summoned forty-five victuallers before the Mayor, at the Town-hall, yesterday, for having light weights in use. In some instances, the difference did not exceed from one to two ounces in 14lb., and in no case did it appear that the weights so used were unstamped. The Mayor expressed his determination to protect the public from fraud, by enforcing the penalty of £5, prescribed by the Act 5th and 6th Victoria, on all future occasions, but as it appeared that it was in consequence of wear, and neglect in having the weights properly adjusted, that the deficiency arose, his Worship fined the parties according to the number in their possession, from £1 to 10s., 5s., and in some instances, 2s. 6d. only. The victuallers disclaimed any intention whatever on their part to defraud the public.

At the Police-Office, on Monday, before T. P. Vokes, John Crips, Esqrs. and Colonel Mansel, Maurice Roche, Catherine Dea, and John Gray, were fined 5s. each, for drunkenness. Five others, who had been in gaol since Saturday night, for the same offence, were discharged. Stephen O'Neill, a sweep, for an assault on a crown witness, and Michael O'Neill, for stealing ropes, were remanded for Petty Sessions.
