Emigration.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.
SINCE the earliest period of Irish Emigration to the present, the Port of Limerick stands unequalled for quick and safe transit of Emigrants to America, and under the Providence of God, this fortunate circumstance is equally to be attributed to the class of Ships, and the excellent accommodation which has been provided by the Emigration Offices of this City. With an ardent desire to protect so laudable a trade from any obstruction that may impede its progress, we beg leave to give timely notice to the proprietors of the different Emigration Offices, that a number of Casks are making at present for the use of Water for Emigrants, of foul and noxious timbers, viz, from sugar, dye stuffs, oil, and tobacco staves, which will have an immediate bad effect on the purity of the water.
As such description of casks are perfectly at variance with the recent Acts passed 5th and 6th Vic. cap. 107, and provided against impure and unsafe casks for the use of emigration, it is strongly to be hoped that none of them will be purchased, and that the Government local Emigration Agent, Lieutenant Lynch, in the discharge of his duty, on surveying the casks, will strictly adhere to the provisions of the Act of Parliament.

MEETING FOR ABOLITION
Of Ministers' Money.

AT a numerous meeting of the Inhabitants of St. JOHN'S PARISH, held at the Temperance Society Rooms, Charlottes'-quay, on THURSDAY, the 28th inst. to petition Parliament for the total abolition of Ministers' Money, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:—
On the motion of Alderman Geary, Alderman Ryan, ex-Mayor, and J. P., was called to the chair, and Wm. O'Hara, Esq., was appointed Secretary,
Proposed by Mr. Richard Raleigh, and seconded by Mr. Martin Roohan:

Resolved—That considering the rights of conscience we feel it a duty due, not alone to the inhabitants of this Parish, but to all who respect the voluntary principle, to record our opposition to the Tax called "Ministers' Money," which was enacted at a time when religious toleration was unknown; and that it is the unanimous opinion of this meeting that Petitions be forthwith presented to both Houses of Parliament, praying for the total and immediate abolition of this odious impost.
Proposed by Alderman Geary; seconded by Mr. Richard Raleigh.

Resolved—That it be referred to the following Committee, to prepare same, to be signed by the Chairman, on behalf of this Meeting, viz.—Alderman Ryan, Alderman Geary, James B. Boyd, Martin Roohan, and William O'Hara, Esqrs.
Proposed by Mr. David Garvey; seconded by Mr. James Quin,

Resolved—That the Petition to the House of Commons be presented by John O'Brien, Esq. M.P., and that James Kelly, Esq. M.P. and the County Members be requested to support its prayer; and that the Petition to the House of Lords be presented by Lord Mont-Eagle, and that the Marquiss of Lansdowne and Clanricarde and Lords Clare, Devon and Dunraven, be requested to give it their support.
