ROLLS COURT.—SATURDAY,

Lane *a.* Mockler.

Mr. Lane, as counsel for the plaintiff, applied for an order "to restrain the sequestrator appointed by the Lord Bishop of Cashel from receiving any part of the income of the defendant, the Rev. James Mockler, incumbent of Lisronan, diocese of Cashel." The learned counsel stated that the Rev. defendant's income was in May, 1840, charged with the payment of a policy of insurance upon his life, and with an annuity of £85 originally assigned to a Miss O'Dell, from whom he borrowed £400, and subsequent to those assignments, the Bishop of Cashel sued out the sequestration at the instance of the other judgment creditors.

The Master of the Rolls stated that an *ex parte* case had been made to warrant him in granting the injunction until further order.

Scott *a.* Scott.

Mr. Richard Warren applied in this case, on behalf of the defendant, for an order to enable officers of the court to examine Mr. Justice Burton, an important witness in the cause, at his own house in Stephen's-green. The defendant's solicitor had communicated with Judge Burton on the subject, and it was necessary to make the order to enable the examiner to take depositions out of his proper office.

Lord Brougham has moved for returns of the premiums on Exchequer-bills, and the dividends on railway stock, Irish and English, during the past year, and the names of persons holding shares in Irish Railway Companies on the 1st of February inst.; for the purpose of facilitating Lord G. Bentinck's railway bill.

The Irish party, Lord Monteagle in the chair, have resolved that it is not expedient to extend the electoral division to an union rating, and that the out-door relief to able bodied paupers would be ruinous to the rate-payers.

The Duke of Richmond and Lord Stanley, most influential members of the House of Peers, are decidedly favourable to Lord G. Bentinck's bill for the promotion of Railways in Ireland, by a loan of 16 millions from Government at 3½ per cent. The Ministry are adverse to the project, which, however, was read a first time in the Commons, with cheers from both sides of the house.

Earl Listowel has withdrawn his petition against the St. Alban's election return.

In the House of Commons, on the bringing up the report on the Destitute Persons (Ireland) Advances

subjects vitally affecting the interests of this kingdom.

This requisition has been already signed by a number of influential persons in Clare, including Sir Lucius O'Brien, and the meeting, it is expected, will be held at Ennis on the 16th inst. The subject is one for very grave and serious consideration, and should be promptly taken up by this and other counties, as the operation of the Labour rate Act is a sad proof of the results of hasty legislation.

MURDER OF HUSBAND AND WIFE.

A double murder, which could not be exceeded in atrocity in the most savage country, was perpetrated in the town of Askeaton upon Saturday night last. The unhappy victims were David Fitzgerald and his wife, an industrious and inoffending couple. The murders were committed with Fitzgerald's own hatchet, which was found covered with blood, and we learn from one who visited the awful scene upon Sunday morning, that the spectacle was most revolting and hideous.—The gashes upon the faces of the unfortunate victims, their brains protruding, and the floor of the house was literally deluged with blood. The fatal blows must have been rapidly inflicted, and with deadly force, as no alarm was heard, although the house was in the centre of several others, and within ten yards of the Police-barrack, and at a very early hour of the night as Fitzgerald or his wife had not undressed or retired to bed. Robbery is supposed to have been the object that led to this horrifying crime, as Fitzgerald's boxes were found unlocked and apparently rifled. A man named John M'Carthy, who worked as a journeyman weaver with Fitzgerald, and who was at Fitzgerald's house on Saturday night, was suspected and surrendered himself to the Police. An inquest is holding the last two days before Dr. Enraght, the Coroner, and an intelligent jury, assisted by Carrol Naish, Esq. one of the local magistrates of the district.

On Monday last, Sub-Inspector Williams, of this City, received information that arms were concealed in the house of John Molony, (now in the county jail for the recent attack on David Barry, of Ballybrood,) when he sent that active officer, Head Constable Joynt, with a party, to Ballybrood where they found concealed, under a dreser, a new blunderbuss with a spring bayonet. This formidable weapon is near two inches across the muzzle. Great praise is due to Sub-Inspector Williams for unkennelling Molony, and his gang, five of whom are now in jail to abide their trial next assizes for the attack on David Barry.

A sheep, on the farm of Lieut.-General Bourke, at Raheen, was killed last night, and the carcase taken

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
