the coach, due at nine, on Wednesday morning, did not arrive in Dublin, on Wednesday, until one o'clock, next day, until ½-past 1 this morning. Limerick did not arrive in Dublin, on Wednesday, until 11 o'clock, five hours after time, by the snow, and a bad tempered driver delayed the coach nearly an hour at Limerick, a similar delay occurred on Thursday.

The letters were not delivered in Dublin this morning, on two and three o'clock afternoon, in consequence of the want of space, disappointment, and loss, in consequence of those to whom they were addressed. The neglect of the Post-office and constabulary part of the correspondence of the south is the same abeyance. The Railway Company have a waiting train for the mail at least during this bad weather, when they are unable, with frost, snow and fog, to keep up the pace in specified time.

In consequence of the intense severity of the weather, the public works have been suspended in various places. In consequence of the order of the Lord Lieutenant, labourers are suspended from their wages.

The victualler, Newtown market, has purchased several heifers, fed for Lord Clarina, at

Undine, of this port, which sails hence for New York, on the 15th inst. The fare for adults in this splendid schooner is £4, and the majority of those about to emigrate are small farmers and servants, from Tipperary, Clare, Ballingarry, and Pallaskenry.

The last Liverpool steamer, the "Ajax," took 270 passengers to that port from Cork for embarkation for New-York, at the rate of £3 per head, that is 10s. for conveyance to Liverpool, and £2 10s. to New-York.

Of 32,153 persons who emigrated last year to Canada, 26,186 were from Ireland, and the rest from England, Wales, and Scotland.

John Nee, sailor belonging to the *Elutheria*, from New-York to this port with Indian corn, was brought before the Magistrates at the Police-office, on Thursday, charged upon information with smuggling 60lbs. of contraband tobacco, and having pleaded guilty of the offence, was fined £100 or twelve months imprisonment. Mr. Carte prosecuted for the Customs. The vessel is under seizure.

The only authenticated instance of death, from want and destitution in this county, is that of William Long, a poor labouring man, aged 30 years only. He was employed on the public works at Moneymile, near Ballyhahill, and on the return of his comrades from dinner they found him dead on the side of the road. The wretched victim did not offer to accompany the other men to dinner, not having a meal of food, or the price of it. His bones were nearly protruding through the skin. Mr. Enright, coroner, held an inquest on the body. Verdict—Died from long continued want and privation.

Denis Bradish, a labouring man, who was occasionally employed as watchman on board vessels at the quays, was found drowned in the river at the King's Island, on Thursday. James Bennett, Esq., coroner, held an inquest. Verdict—Accidental death.

Bridget M'Namara, a milk woman, when returning home to Park, from market in the Irishtown, yesterday morning, accompanied by her daughter and another woman, slipped off the canal bank into the river, and perished before assistance arrived. The body was taken up an hour after.

James Rawlins, a young man, died suddenly on Wednesday, at Lismacreeery, in this county, while at supper. James Magrath died suddenly at Lacca, in the act of smoking a pipe.

James Corboy, son of the late driver of the Nenagh and Limerick coach, is committed to Nenagh gaol for the alleged robbery of a bank parcel of £1521. It is the Tipperary Joint Stock Bank (to which the missing money belonged,) and not the Bank of Ireland, that has offered a reward of £100 for recovery of the parcel.
