explaining away uncalled-for charges—uncalled for,
because the men were ordered by me to be transferred
to other works in the usual way, and the person who
suspended the works (a respectable young man,) is ready
to prove. With regard to the second Resolution, you will
please inform the Gentlemen of the Committee, that I
think they mistook their duty when they passed it.
To say the least of it, it is a most unjustifiable assump-
tion. My duties are most onerous, complicated, and
extensive. I mean to attend to them to the best of my
judgment and abilities; and if the gentlemen of the
committee will in future attend to theirs only, they
will spare me the trouble of explaining to them in
more explicit terms my unwillingness to be troubled
with Resolutions to which I have neither time nor
inclination to attend.

Our Committee had also reason to complain of Mr.
Keating having allowed the grants for the works then
in progress to be expended without sufficient notice—
the consequence of which was, that he had apply to the
Committee, on the 29th ult., to become personally
responsible for the money required to carry them on
from Saturday to the passing of the Presentments at
the Extraordinary Sessions, to be held on the Mon-
day following.

It is not now denied that concurrent with, if not
previous to the existence of these causes of complaint
on the part of our Committee, Mr. Keating had to
encounter the displeasure of his superior officers, and
that it was because of the dissatisfactory discharge of
the duties of his office that they decided on suspending
him. And yet because our committee dared to find
fault with the transgressions of a public officer, these
transgressions militating against the interests of the
classes intended to be relieved thro' us on the Public
Works, is the committee of which I am chairman,
attempted to be held up to public odium, and it is
thought necessary to enforce by such violence the
adoption of a memorial in favour of Mr. Keating
which for falsehood, and all the attributes of a docu-
ment disgraceful to those who drew, and were capable
of adopting it, stands unparalleled in the records of such
like deeds. The excitement got up for the purpose of
compelling the adoption of that memorial is easily
accounted for by the apprehension of dismissal
on the part of a great number of the staff, who worked
on the ignorance and credulity of the people, and made
them believe that on Mr. Keating's tenure of office de-
pended their continuance on the works; but a true
light can only be thrown on the whole of this affair
including particularly the proceedings of Tuesday last,
by a publication of the list of stewards, overseers,
cheque clerks, pay clerks, &c. acting under Mr. Keat-
ing, to which a fitting and instructive corollary would
be the names of applicants for such offices. It may be
well to state that the "important meeting" held on
Tuesday was appointed for the purpose of entertaining
any complaints the working people had to make, these
complaints to be preferred by three of their number. I
as chairman, having refused to submit to the dic-
tation of the mob on Saturday by signing the memorial
referred to, but promising that a meeting should be
held for the above purpose.

The resolution passed at the meeting that—"It hav-
ing been understood that Mr. Keating's suspension has
taken place in consequence of charges brought against
him by the Shanagolden relief committee, which
charges, it is alleged, have not been fairly inves-
tigated, we feel ourselves called upon to memorialize
the Board of Works, for the purpose of obtaining for
Mr. Keating a full and fair investigation," clearly shews
that it was dictated solely by a sense of justice to an
individual, to whom it was alleged full justice had not
been done. An impression has been made on the
minds of the people, that Mr. Keating has been found
fault with, for increasing the number of labourers. So
far from this being the fact, a resolution entered on
our books, dated the 4th of December, and which was
read to the meeting on Tuesday, although omitted in
the report, distinctly states, that the committee would
resign, if a requisition for a large number of men was
not supplied—and it was supplied accordingly. I shall
conclude by expressing the hope that as you have pro-
mised to have an eye to the proceedings of persons in
this neighbourhood, that it will be a close one. I shall
take this opportunity, with your permission, of giving
the most unqualified denial to a report circulated for
purpose that cannot be mistaken—namely, that I, or
any other member of the committee, found fault with
the labourers earning more than ten pence per day.
