At an extraordinary presentment sessions for the barony of Clanwilliam held in the court house of Tipperary, Henry Massy, Esq., J.P., in the chair, Mr. Cooper, civil engineer, stated that the amount on hands was £3,180, and that £8,007 would be required to finish the works. The chairman said the people are starving, and if you will take a suggestion from me you will pass 3s. 4d. in the pound on the valuation of the baorony. Joseph Cooke, Esq., proposed, and Stephen O'Meagher, Esq. seconded, the resolution, "that 3s. 4d. in the pound be now passed." -- Carried.

Mr. John Cahalan; connected with the Nenagh branch of the National Bank, is promoted to the Tipperary branch of the same establishment.

An establishment is about being opened in Williamstreet for the indiscriminate sale of Birmingham guns !

At the London Corn Exchange, on Monday last, there was an advance of 48 to 5s per quarter on wheat; caused, it is said, by the intrusion of Liverpool grain speculators, who bought up largely. Indian corn sold at 66s to 72s per quarter.

The quantity of seed required for green crops becomes now a most important question. Last year, not more than 60,000 or 70,000 acres of turnips were sown in Ireland; and this year, seven times that breadth of land should be sown with turnips and other green crops, otherwise no provision will be made for the cattle next winter; and consequently, the supply of manure in 1848 will be still more deficient.

A man of the name of Richardson, from Knocksentry, has been arrested for firing at and wounding Thos. Walsh, near Bridgetown, county Clare, in November

last, and fully identified and committed.

On Thursday, two armed men entered the house of Mr. Merridyth, at Castletown, within four miles of Birr, during his absence at the fair, and after breaking open sundry locks, took away a valuable double-harrelled gun and powder-horn; also several silver spoons and a quantity of wearing apparel.

On Sunday last a labourer named James Nunan, died from hunger at Ballynatruck. The deceased was found lying on the road side with his wife. He was a native of the county Limerick, and his wife stated that they had subsisted two days on a single turnip !

Friday night the horse of John Hogan, of Caherina. between Crusheen and Ennis, was maliciously shot.

On Sunday night last the relief depot at Cahirconlish was robbed of two sacks of whole meal. Constable Moran succeeded in recovering 30 stone of it, and arrested four persons on suspicion of the outrage.

One of the most atrocious murders that ever was committed took place on Thursday night, four miles to the west of Louisburgh, Mavo. It appears that two sisters, Mary and Honor Gibbons, lived near their brother, James Gibbons; Mary went on that day to Louisburgh to purchase provisions, but did not return, in her absence the house was burned, as well as her unfortunate sister. The coroner and police found hid in James Gibbons' house a quantity of the unfortunate woman's property; it was also discovered that he sold at day break the feather hed on which she lay the night she was murdered. Gibbons was somewhat burned. and there was evidence from two relatives against him. The jury unanimously returned a verdict of wilful murder against the unnatural monster, who has been fully committed. It was with difficulty the police saved him from the stones which the people flung.

On Saturday, a number of persons from Clerihan, attacked two carmen conveying flour to Cashel, and carried away one hag; one of the carmen presented a pistol at the head of the leader of the party, and swore
