LIMERICK UNION.—The Board met this day, for workhouse business, John T. Devitt, Esq. in the chair. The Clerk stated, that there was but 5s. funds—no meal, no bread, nor Indian meal. There was £4000 rate due of the rural districts, and a large sum due to the bread, milk, and other contractors. The rural guardians urged the necessity of striking a new rate, to which the City guardians objected, on the ground that nearly the entire of the City rate had been paid in, and that it would be grievously unjust to charge the rural arrears, by a new tax, on the City, and which could not be less than 3s. in the pound. The striking of this rate was eventually left to a committee for Wednesday next. The bread, meal, and milk contractors were fined 20s. each for the bad quality of these articles. Mr. Honan gave the master an order on the Bank for three tons of meal.
