LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

DAY EVENING, APRIL 3.

On Tuesday, informed the House of Commons, after the Easter recess, bring the Bill for the relief of Ireland, in consequence of the petition of their Lordships. The House adjourned on Thursday, the 15th of April.

The Poor Relief Bill passed through the House of Commons on Monday night. A clause in the Poor relief bill empowers an increase to persons occupying land of more value than £5, and desirous of emigrating, to be willing to forgive all arrears of rent, and two-thirds of the sum required for their passage, and half the sum so advanced by the Government. By this provision, every poor man is afforded the opportunity of relieving the pressure of a surplus population, and of obtaining the means of securing comfort and health in a British colony. Mr. Gregory proposed a clause that no person occupying more than a certain extent of land than a certain number of acres should be considered as a destitute person under the Act, which was agreed to.

Mr. Bentinck's amendment by which the poor rate in the case in England, was to be liable to be increased, was negatived by a majority of the House.

Mr. Smith, an eminent clergyman to whom Mr. Smith introduced in Parliament, preliminary to the Bill for the Irish Poor-law, is Rev. W. Willis, the distress in his district appeared in consequence of the failure of the potato crop.

The Bill for the sale to suit the convenience of Irish tenants, and the third reading of the Poor Relief Bill, and the Landed Property (Ireland) Bill, passed on the 16th of April.

Mr. O'Brien, on Wednesday, hoped it would go to show that the best way of relieving the prevailing distress is by the employment in cultivating or reclaiming land, which is more valuable.

Mr. O'Brien, on Tuesday, moved for copies of the Acts and Amendments passed by the magistrates and the Extraordinary Sessions at Corofin, county of Clare, on the 11th of November, 1846, and at Ennistymon, for the relief of the poor at Corcomroe, on the 4th December same year, and for reproductive works, under Mr. O'Brien's Act, and which were sent to the Under-Secretary for Ireland, or the Board of Works.

Mr. O'Brien proposed to find that although Government had passed the Bill with O'Brien's motion to tax Irish agriculture, the Government are determined to carry the spirit of his motion. Sir George Grey, the Home Secretary, intimated that the Ministry intend to carry out the measure under which all Irish vagrants are to be considered as paupers, of course including noble and aristocratic families, as our English neighbours would do themselves to the ungenerous reproach of the Government, and expelling the poor!

Mr. O'Brien left Paris on Monday, for Orleans, and to Rome. The Archbishop of Paris had refused to give him a passport, and gave permission for him to hear Mass in his own apartment.

The convictions were, James O'Brien assault on Philip Connors, a bailiff, one year's imprisonment; Daniel O'Brien, for same, to be transported seven years; Mary Drew, larceny, one week's imprisonment; John Galvin, like, one month; Ellen Treasy, do., one fortnight; Margaret Angus, do., one week; Denis Ahern, do., three months; Judith Regan, do., two months. John Sweeny, a discharged check clerk, for obstructing the Inspecting officer of the Board of Works, was ordered to be kept in custody until he entered into security to keep the peace. The court did not sit on yesterday.
