Castle-connell soup kitchen this week, declined the
trouble of calling, thus negating the alleged plea of
their distress.

The average of 5,000 tons of provisions are drawn
weekly from the different stores, in this city, to the
interior, to supply the wants of the population.

The Cork Society of Friends distributed £1,200 in
the last week to mitigate the privations of the poor in
that district.

The great majority of the donors in America, of the
provisions by the American frigate *Jamestown*, are of
the Independent Methodist religious community.
