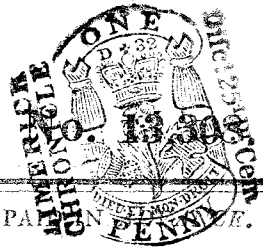

Waterford Limerick Railway

Bill has been introduced into the House of Commons and is now a Bill to authorise certain alterations in the Waterford and Limerick Railway Act relating thereto. It is given that application will be made to the said House of Commons, for leave to insert therein the provisions of the said Act enacted for the said Company, from and of the Railway Branch Railway authorised to be made, to pay from the annual profits of the said undertaking not exceeding in the whole Eight per centum, on the amount of the respective Shareholders in the said Bill as was thereby provided, that in the said profits exceeding that amount a maximum rate of dividend, the surplus profits should be applied to the rates, tolls, and duties by the said Act authorised to be levied, in such times and in such manner as the said Board may think proper. It is further provided that no restriction as to the amount of the said dividend shall be made, which is injurious to the interests of the said Company, that the said provision shall be repealed. 17th April, 1847 (seven.)

In Chancery

Dr. Enright, coroner, held inquests at Glin, on the body of a child unknown, aged about five years, found in a field, and partly eaten by dogs or pigs; on the body of a man name unknown, supposed to be a sailor, found drowned near Newtown; on the body of Margaret Leddin, a grown woman, found dead in a creek near Melion, with wounds on head and person; and at Lisbane, on the body of Patrick Barry, who was killed by a log of timber which fell on him.

Denis Sheehan and his wife are committed for trial, charged with the murder of William Sheehan, brother of the former, at Killavullen, county Cork, by fracturing his skull, and then throwing his body into the Blackwater, where it was discovered. A money dispute was the supposed cause of the fratricide.

A dangerous fire at Mohill fever hospital was extinguished by the military under Captain Mundy, 33d. In the libel case of Lord Lucan v. Hon. F. Cavendish, of the Mayo Telegraph, the Queen's Bench has refused the motion of defendant to change the venue from Dublin to Castlebar.

The Lord Bishop of Limerick has arrived at Lorrha glebe, the seat of the Rev. Edward H. Knox.

The Bishop of London presided at the distribution of prizes at the King's College, London, on Saturday, to medical students, including John Cox Lynch for anatomy, chemistry, and materia medica.

The Rev. Nicholas Beatty, formerly a priest of the Church of Rome, but now of the Priests' Protection Society, denies a statement of the Tablet newspaper, that he been expelled from the convents of Mullinham and Waterford, of which he was superior—"I never have been expelled from those convents, but left them of my own free will."

The late Bishop of Sodor and Man, Dr. Shirley, was born at Westport, county of Mayo, on the 20th of May, 1797, but was educated at Winchester school and Oxford University. His first ministerial charge was as a curate to his father, the Rev. Walter Shirley, rector of Woodford, Northamptonshire. Dr. Shirley belonged to what is called the "Evangelical party" in the church, but held no extreme views with respect to doctrine or discipline.

The Rev. Dr. Walsh, P.P. of Clonckilly, will be consecrated R. C. Bishop of Cloyne and Ross at Thurles, to-morrow, in room of the late Right Rev. Dr. Droty. The Right Rev. Dr. Ryan, of this city, will attend the ceremonial.

The Rev. Dr. Hearne, late of St. Patrick's, Manchester, whose removal thence caused considerable discussion in the Roman Catholic community at the time, is now in Rome, some charges which he has preferred against the Bishop of the district being under the consideration of the papal court.

Major O'Leary, 55th, presided at district court-martial on Wednesday, in the Castle barracks.

On Monday the troops in Clonmel, viz. Royal Artillery, troop Scots Greys, and 34th Depot, proceeded in review order to Marlfield, where they performed a variety of manoeuvres before Colonel Sir Charles O'Donnell. The weather was fine, and a large number of civilians were on the ground.

Major General D'Aguiar, commanding at Hong Kong, has been obliged to seek for benefit of his health, by change of air, and a visit to Canton.

The Barrack Master of Waterford has offered the use of the tents in the barracks for the accommodation of the Fever Hospital or Board of Guardians.

In consequence of the increase in the price of the ration of forage for horses of the Royal Artillery and Cavalry, the allowance to inn-keepers and others, for such horses on billet, is to be one shilling and one penny per horse per night.

Major W. R. Brudenell Smith is appointed a Relief Inspector, under 10th Viet. chap. 7, "An act for the temporary relief of destitute persons in Ireland."

The Duke of Manchester's youngest son, Lord Frederick Montagu, has entered the army as Ensign, in the 52d Light Infantry.

Major Campbell, who retired from the 7th Hussars, and purchased the property of De Rouville, Canada East, has received the appointment of Civil Secretary, vice Higginson, appointed Governor of Antigua.

Two companies of the 10th under Capt. Sir M. Tuite, have moved from Demerara to Berbice.
