The meeting took place, but passed off quietly owing
to the exertions of the clergy and gentry, who had

vociferated against out-door relief through the medium
of depots, and said they should get work.

The following notice was posted on Knockea Chapel,
within three miles of this City on Sunday—“All per-
sons employed or disemployed on the public works are
requested to meet at Knockea-hill on Tuesday the 4th
of May, to consider the best way to manage for their
support, and to put an end to porridge houses.” The
labourers assembled in obedience to this summons, and
to the sounding of horns, when they resolved not to
accept the rations administered under the out door
relief bill.

STATE OF THE COUNTRY.

Sunday last, during divine service, about one o'clock,
at noon, four armed men whose faces were partly dis-
guised, entered the farm-yard of Sir Hugh Dillon Massy,
Bart. at Doonass, and took from his caretaker's house
a musket, carbine, and bayonet. W. S. Tracy, Esq. S.M.
who heard of the outrage, in a few moments crossed
the river from Castle Connell, and went on in pursuit
with the police, but without success.

Saturday last, about 2 o'clock, as Edmund Duggan,
a respectable farmer, and in good circumstances, was
walking the road near his own house, at Doon, near
Broadford, he was fired at from behind a ditch by two
men, and when he fell they ran out, fractured his skull
in several places, and cut his throat, nearly severing
the head from his body. The cause assigned for this
savage murder is, that Duggan purchased a reversionary
lease of some land the title to which expired this
month. The unfortunate victim of this barbarous
outrage was understood to be in very good repute with
all his neighbours, and he has left a disconsolate widow
and ten orphan children.

On Sunday night, Christopher Miller's house at
Cooleybrown, in this county, was attacked by an armed
party, consisting of seven men. Miller, aided by his
wife, made a gallant resistance, took two guns from
those ruffians, and it is supposed that he wounded one
of them dangerously. Miller's head was laid open, and
he received a gun shot wound in the arm. He is under
the care of Dr. O'Loughlen, of Rathkeal.

We are happy to state that his medical attend-
ants have pronounced Mr. John G. Wilson out of
danger. It is almost miraculous how he escaped the
fatal shot, and though the left side of his coat and vest
were torn away by the discharge, only three of the slugs
entered his breast.
