The gun was loaded with heavy shot, a quantity of which lodged in his horse, and deprived him of an eye. Mr. Singleton on seeing the assassin at once fired a pistol at him, and jumped over the wall, but the field being a strong crag he was unable to come up with him, so after a short pursuit he gave up the attempt to overtake him. Mr. Singleton ill deserved this treatment from his tenants, having last year advanced them £70 worth of oatmeal, which they never repaid, and gave them lime and advanced them seed oats to till their ground. There are now two years rent due, and in consequence of seeking for a part of his rent he is made the but of an hired assassin. Mr. Singleton, to show his tenants how little he feared them, at once proceeded to the land and impounded every beast to be found thereon. Some of them told Mr. Singleton that Government intend taking away the land from the landlords!!

The operations of this useful charity are not confined to City patients. Individuals are constantly in the hospital from the counties of Clare, Limerick, and Tipperary—it is also the asylum for all the sick sailors in port.
