Apostle.

Miss Synan of Fedamore, and Miss Ryan, sister of the late Mayor of Limerick, have entered on a Noviciate at the Sisters of Mercy Convent in this City.

The oldest Roman Catholic Chapel in Limerick is not more than a century standing, that of St. Munchin, in Thomond ward, built in 1744; St. John's was erected in 1749, and St. Mary's in 1753.

There was a meeting at the South Parish Chapel, Cork, on Sunday, to subscribe for a public monument to the late Right Rev. Dr. Murphy.

The Carmelite Nunnery at Tallow has appealed to the public to release them from bankruptcy, caused by a Waterford gentleman, who owes them £1400.
