About seven o'clock, on yesterday evening, the house
of a gentleman residing in Glentworth-street, while he
and his family were out walking, was entered by two
young villians who succeeded, by means of false keys, in
opening the sideboard and would have plundered it of
its contents, but fortunately one of the servants who
was only absent a few minutes returned, when the
word was given by the younger of the two, who was
standing in the hall, and both rushed out and escaped.
This should be a caution to families and to servants in
particular; and, it is supposed, the entrance was
effected by means of false keys, as one of the party
had a large bunch in his hand, and also a shoemaker's
pincers.

Thursday afternoon, a party of armed fellows attacked
the house of Mr. John Drew, of Trunana, near Adare,
and demanded money, which, instead of getting, they
were warmly received by Drew and his servants, who not
only made them decamp but pursued them a con-
siderable distance.

Thomas Hanly of Ballynort, fired shots there, killed his
dog, and were very near shooting his daughter, the ball

decent inoffensive man, employed as a steward on Lord
Guillamore's estate.

A few days ago, Joynt, a civil-bill officer of this
county, was attacked, near Askeaton, in the open day,
by men with faces blackened, who threatened his life,
and compelled him to throw all the processes on the
road—not one of which he was suffered to serve.

arrived here to-day, from Buttevant, on escort with
ammunition for the troops in garrison.
