Mr. Blackall—My lord, we do not consider ourselves bound by the certificate of the valuator for the board of works. There were instances where we wished to give more damages than were certified for. In the present state of the law the damages between landlord and tenant are left to be arranged between themselves. The certificate does not apportion them, and therefore the tenant can have no protection against the landlord. If we are bound by this certificate, we are then perfectly useless as a grand jury.

Chief Justice—This new act will provide sufficiently for them, and meet all your objections. It will do away with compelling the tenant to pay for roads exclusively, as heretofore. The crown solicitor will be allowed £3 3s. per day to cover his expenses while attending to traverses, but will receive no fees, as he now does. His lordship then proceeded to fiat the presentments.

James Bennett, Esq., Coroner, held an inquest at the County Infirmary on Thursday, upon the body of James Fitzgerald, bailiff, who was stoned to death at the Blackboy-pike, while in the act of driving cattle into the City on Wednesday. The Jury returned a verdict "that deceased died in consequence of a beating he received from a party of men and women on the 6th July, at the Blackboy-pike, and that Patt Ryan (Early), Bridget Ryan, his wife, and Bridget, his daughter, were principals in the homicide." The prisoners have been committed for trial.
