A vessel belonging to Mr. John Delaney, merchant, Sligo, on her voyage homeward from New York, was boarded on Saturday, off Belmullet, by thirty row boats, containing at least 120 men, who, after a short parley with the crew of the brig, plundered her cargo in an effectual manner, having carried off three hundred bags of Indian corn. The vessel was becalmed when the outrage was perpetrated, but fortunately a breeze came on while seven of the marauders were in the hold, when the captain ordered the hatches to be secured, and the delinquents were brought in durance to Sligo, where they were committed for trial.

A ship sailed from Sligo, this week, for Canada, with 200 emigrants, tenants of Sir Robert Gore Booth, who has provided for these adventurers.

To-morrow will be St. Swithin's day, an ominous epoch in the calendar. St. Swithin lived a thousand years ago. He was bishop of Winchester, and priest to King Egbert. He was the deviser and originator of tithes in England. The story runs that, being buried by his own request in the churchyard of the cathedral, the priests a hundred years after commenced the work of translating the remains into the interior. They were stopped by a heavy fall of rain, which lasted forty days, by which time they were convinced that it was designed to stop them, and they gave up the point. Ever since the popular superstition is, that if there be rain on St. Swithin's day, there will be rain for the forty ensuing days. ROYAL COLLEGE OF SURGEONS IN IRELAND.

Saturday the magistrates at Douglas Petty Sessions, Cork, took informations against Mr. George Carr, of the Cork workhouse, for having buried several hundred bodies at Monees, so as to create a nuisance by offensive and dangerous effluvia from the burial ground.
