few days back, the loan of half a million of money.— His having been in London, and his knowledge of the right mode of effecting things, caused the Floating Dock and Harbour Duty Bill to pass. This demonstrates one fact as important to us, viz. —that we should have our members, or at least one of them, in London during the session, to attend to our interests, and we should have, as the member for Liverpool, Lord Sandon, has for it, an office in London for the business of the city.
Have we any chance after this lapse of time since he refused the offer of representing us, of securing the important services of a man, who, to serve the poor of his native City, sacrificed thousands in the erection of an hospital which is not only an ornament to Limerick but of inestimable value to the poor? Is there another man so qualified by business, habits, by his energy, his influence, his local knowledge, his experience, his tact, and the respect we owe him, to represent us in Parliament? I assert as the conviction of my mind, that there is no such man to be found, and it is our duty to ourselves and to the generations which are to come after us in this city to use every exertion to induce him to represent us in Parliament. Next session the all-important measure for Limerick is to come under the notice of Government, and the Parliament, namely the Packet Station for the West. Now is the time to secure this boon, and Sir Mathew Barrington is our man if we can secure him. Should we obtain it, look at the trade, the manufactures, the improvement, commerce and agriculture, the change which the social and moral, and physical condition of our ancient city would undergo. We would then have no poor artizans, no idle labourers; all would flourish, our shops and shop-keepers would be, indeed, greatly advanced, and the assertion long since made by Sir Robert Kane would be realized—"if Limerick ever became the packet station she would be the Liverpool of Ireland; the finest city from her agricultural and physical position which Ireland ever saw." Let us, therefore, stir ourselves and secure this longed-for position—now or never is the time. Let a requisition be got up, signed by every one who, in his heart, is a Limerick man, calling upon Sir Mathew Barrington to come forward as our representative. Let the man who wants employment, and desires to see his native city what she might and may be, now stir him- self and aid in this effort, and we will, I have little doubt, make Limerick what we so desire to see her.
