Have we any chance after this lapse of time since

Let a requisition be got up, signed by every one who, in his heart, is a Limerick man, calling upon Sir Mathew Barrington to come forward as our representative. Let the man who wants employment, and desires to see his native city what she might and may be, now stir himself and aid in this effort, and we will, I have little doubt, make Limerick what we so desire to see her.
