GUARDIAN UNION.—The Guardians had a very full meeting to-day, Counsellor Devitt in the chair. John Gabbett, was elected wardsman, in room of William Gabbett, dismissed* at a salary of £15 per annum. Mr. Gabbett read the following report of the committee appointed to form Relief districts throughout the city:—"We recommend that the following electoral districts be formed into Relief districts, and that one relieving officer be appointed to each, at the following salaries:—Killokennedy, £52; Kilseely, £50; Kiltannaughta, £45; Kiltannonlea, £52; Killeely, £52; Kiltavin, £45; Mungret, £45; Patrick's-well, £45; Fedamore, £45; Ballybricken, £45; Cahirciveen and Cahircionlish, £52; Castle-Connell, £45; Cappamore and Doon, £52; Abington, £52; Cappamore and Doon. A discussion ensued as to whether two or three relieving officers would be appointed for the city, the salary of each being set down at £60 per annum. Mr. Gabbett enforced economy, and said the extravagance of the Relief committee and Board of Guardians would bring ruin on the struggling, but respectable shopkeepers, who must be heavily taxed for the enormous sums voted away without regard to their interests. He was supported by the Chairman, Capt. Carrig, Mr. Win. A. Kirby, and Mr. John Dundon, who were opposed to high salaries for Relief officers. The report was subsequently adopted, and it has been agreed to pay the three relieving officers for the city only £1 per week—the rural, according to the above scale.
