At the Magistrates' office, on Monday, seven drunk-  
ards were fined 5s each, or 48 hours' imprisonment, for  
disturbing the streets on the sabbath.  
Government intends, in consequence of the great  
demand for labour in the British Australian Colonies,  
and at the Cape of Good Hope, to resume Free emigra-  
tion to those countries. The scheme of emigration  
is to be under the conduct of her Majesty's Colonial  
Land and Emigration Commissioners.  
Dr. Cranfield has resigned the Ballyraggett Dispen-  
sary, Kilkenny.  
The Board of Health require that the paltry fee of  
5s. per day to physicians in fever cases, against which  
the Faculty of Ireland remonstrated in a memorial to  
the Lord Lieutenant, should not be included in the  
estimate of the temporary fever hospital expenses, but  
that the compensation is to be included in the general  
rating of the union.  
The Carrick-on-Shannon rates cannot be collected,  
and as the guardians have no funds, and scarcely any  
credit, the pauper allowance is reduced to 6 oz. of  
rice, and 6 oz. of Indian meal, per day.  
In Liverpool the Stipendiary Magistrate, Mr. Rush-  
ton, has committed several Irish beggars to gaol,  
they having refused to be sent home to their own  
parishes.  
The amount sent by the States to England for the  
relief of the starving Irish and Scotch, since the 1st of  
January, is said to be 1,050,000 dollars.  
Cashel races commence on the 28th September—three  
days running.

The first load of new Wheat was brought to market  
this day, for which the owner demanded 1s. 6d. per  
stone, but there was no inquiry for it. Sold at market,  
by Mr. Thomas Rourke, of Pallaskenry, two bags of  
new Bere Barley, at 7½d. per stone.  
The price of Limerick whiskey at Thomondgate Dis-  
tillery was reduced this day to 7s. 3d. per gallon.  
The *Bryan Abbs*, of this port, sailed to-day, with 140  
adult passengers for Quebec.  
There are at present 41 districts in Ireland receiving  
out door relief. All these, with the exception of 45 in  
the south of Ireland, will be discontinued on Monday  
morning. The Commissariat depots in Ireland are  
closing fast, and the accounts winding up.  
Yesterday morning, some person broke through a  
door, and entered the Poor Relief office at Doonass, and  
took therefrom 12 stone of Indian meal. Sub-constable  
Stack, of that station, searched several houses, but not  
being successful, took several of the poor sufferers with  
him through the town-land of Springfield, where after  
a most diligent search, he found two bags of the meal  
concealed in the bushes, to the great joy of the starv-  
ing poor.
