**DEATHS.**  
 On the 8th instant, at Kilpeacon Rectory, of fever, in his  
 seventeenth year, to the inexpressible grief of his bereaved  
 family, and beloved by all who knew him, Edward, eldest son  
 of Rev. Edward Herbert.  
 On Wednesday, at his seat, Stillorgan, county Dublin,  
 aged 90, Henry Deane Grady, Esq. Q.C. for many years one  
 of the most eminent Lawyers on this circuit. He was father-  
 in-law of Lord Muskerry, Lord Massarene, Lord E. Chichester,  
 Sir David Roche, Bart. and the late Mr. Blennerhassett, of  
 Ballyseeda. The Evening Mail alluding to his death, states—  
 "Death has been, it may be well supposed, narrowing the  
 circle year by year, and they are now nearly passed away. One  
 of the last of that illustrious school has finished his earthly  
 career; and the men of grey heads who survive to remember  
 the brightness of the whole constellation, at length drop a tear  
 over the fall of one of its brightest stars. Henry Deane Grady  
 is no more. He outlived most of his brilliant companions by  
 many a long year; and his cold remains now shed a gloom  
 over the halls of his ancient mansion, which once rang with  
 the peals of his merriment, and echoed the utterance of his  
 wit and wisdom. He was called to the Irish bar in the year  
 1787, where he soon distinguished himself by the wit, humour,  
 and eloquence which were the characteristics of the leading  
 men of his time, and became one of the most successful  
 pleaders in the courts. His rising talents, no less than his  
 high family connection, secured to him the representation in  
 Parliament of the city of Limerick, and he became a patriotic  
 and distinguished senator. Poor Harry Deane Grady! He  
 was the last of his racy and peculiar school. The Irish bar  
 of the present day—Irish society of modern times—has many  
 able and eminent men; but neither the one nor the other  
 anything at all approaching to the class of wits, orators, and  
 patriots of which he was almost the last survivor."

 ing testimonial to my exertions as Government Inspec-  
 tor in their electoral division.

Arduous and often painful as our respective duties  
 have been, they would have proved much more trying  
 if the cordial co-operation between your committee and  
 myself had not shewn to the poor of your district that  
 the Commissioners, and those gentlemen upon whom  
 devolved the local administration of the relief granted,  
 had but one common object, viz.—to diminish the  
 sufferings of the poor to the utmost extent that due  
 consideration for the circumstances of the rate payers  
 would permit. To you, sir, my warmest thanks are
