An Irish clergyman who writes to the Times, gives the following illustration of the monstrous injustice shown to the clergy of Ireland by the present taxation on the poor rate:—" In illustration of the present total confiscation of church property in some parts of Ireland, I beg to state my own case. The gross income of my benefice amounts to £685 per annum. The net income which I derive from the living is £420, out of which the poor rates are to be paid : 6s. in the pound. the present poor rate, on the gross income, will amount to £205 to be stopped from my half year's net income of £210 payable at November; and there can be no doubt that, between the poor rates and the charges for the Isbour rate act, there will be a similar deduction from my income in May next. Such is the reward which the clergy are to receive, after having devoted themselves in mind, body, and estate, to the cause of the poor neglected tenants of, for the most part absentee landlords, during the last sixteen months of plague, pestilence, and famine, in this unhappy land.
