ANOTHER MURDER NEAR CASTLE-CONNELL.

We have to record a second foul and deliberate murder, within a fortnight, in the same neighbourhood, and which was perpetrated at Gardea-hill, near Castle-Connell, on Monday evening last, at the early hour of six o'clock. The victim of this atrocity was Peter Nash, bailiff of the Rev. Thomas Westropp, vicar of Mungret, near this city, by whom he was regarded as a zealous, trustworthy, and industrious man, upon whose exertions depended the maintenance of a large family. While returning from his own residence at nightfall, accompanied by his two sons, the unoffending and unsuspecting man was fired at from behind a ditch, by some vile miscreant, when melancholy to relate, the shot was fatal, no less than eleven slugs having lodged in the back and shoulders of the unfortunate victim, who immediately fell, weltering in blood, to the surprise and horror of his children, who were stupified at the fiendish outrage. The alarm soon spread, and in a few minutes the almost lifeless body of poor Nash was conveyed to his own dwelling, where the scene that ensued amongst the family was of a most affecting nature. The victim of assassination survived only an hour and a half, unable to speak from the time the shot was fired, until death put a period to his sufferings. James Bennett, Esq. coroner, held an inquest yesterday on the body at Castle Connell, when a verdict of wilful murder was returned against some person or persons unknown. It is supposed that Nash had become obnoxious to some parties in the neighbourhood for having at last assizes come forward as a witness, and proved the boundary of a bog, in a case where the Rev. Mr. Westropp took legal proceedings for recovery of his property from persons of the name of Sheppard. To this circumstance is attributable the cold blooded murder of a man who was after laying out work for persons in the neighbourhood for drainage on his employer's estate, and who had paid £20 wages for labour in the last fortnight. Such is the return, and such is the reward! This deadly outrage was committed within a gunshot of the police station of Bunkea, and not half a mile from where John Kelly, a farmer, was murdered not three weeks ago.
