

The result of yesterday's conference has been an unanimous adoption of a resolution to petition the Government for the immediate adoption of measures for prompt and efficient relief to the poor of Ireland.

There was a meeting of the parishioners of St. John's on Sunday, at the chapel, Rev. Mr. Casey in the chair, to promote the rebuilding of that edifice. The foundation stone of the new chapel will be laid on the 1st March next, by Rt. Rev. Dr. Ryan. Resolutions in our next.
