 At a meeting of the Clare Labour Rate Act Committee in Ennis, John O'Brien, Esq. M. P. in the evening it was resolved to address his Excellency the Lieutenant, soliciting a definite answer to the memorial, and respectfully urging a prompt compliance with its prayer, as the unfinished works were fast deteriorating and entailing heavy losses on the already exhausted resources of the country.

The Poor-law Commissioners have refused to accept the resignation of the Newcastle Guardians.  
 Rev. Mr. Kennedy, relieving officer of the Long electoral division is busily engaged doling the out-relief to the poor. It is in money instead of provisions they are relieved—8d. being given to adults, and 4d. to children per week.  
 The Athlone Guardians have refused to strike a match for out-door relief. The motion to increase the salary of Dr. O'Connell, physician to the workhouse, from £60 to £100 a-year, was also rejected.

The Galway town and harbour Commissioners, and the Guardians meet this week to memorial the Treasury for the adoption of that port as a transatlantic station.  
 Mr. Bermingham addressed a meeting at Galway on Monday, in favor of a rail road to Dublin, and a passenger station.

Mr. Brinsden, contractor for the Tralee gas works, threatens to suspend operations unless paid up the instalment by the town Commissioners.
