

The above outrage occurred in one of the wooded parts of this county. Our readers may be reminded of the dreadful conflict which took place, some years since, in this locality, between the police and an army of nightly marauders, on which occasion many lives were lost on both sides; but a reward of £10 for the discovery of the perpetrators of this daring outrage.

Inspector Channer, of Adare, has offered a reward of £50 for discovery of the armed party that assembled at the houses of Richard Barkman, of Trough, and John Kelly, of Woodmount, demanding fire arms, and severely punishing those who refused to comply with their demands.

Warning notes have this week been sent through the post office, to principals, agents, stewards, and others, intimating assassination if the terms pointed out were not complied with.

At the property of Connor Lyons, of Caherbane, a horse was shot out of his stable on Monday night and shot to pieces, having previously taken corn to market.

John Kelly, of Woodmount, was fired at near his residence, on Tuesday, but fortunately escaped.

On Monday night four persons went to the house of an old man named Michael Eustace, of Kiltemper, near Kiltrush, broke open the door, and took what they supposed he had money. When they could not break the lock, one of the party returned to the room where Eustace was, searched for the key, opened the box, and took six pounds.

During this time one of the party was engaged in a frightful conflict, and if it had not been for the good firm and assisted him, there is no doubt he would have been beaten off. They are since identified, through the instrumentality of the Head Constable Mullally.

On Monday night four notorious characters in the neighbourhood of Churchtown, Buttevant, were apprehended in the act of stealing potatoes from a farmer of the name of John O'Connell, by that efficient Constable, Serjeant Cleary, who was on duty under his charge.

On Monday night, five men, all armed, and with their arms, entered the house of a farmer named John Flannery, of Kilbarron, and demanded his money; Flannery told them he had it not, whereupon the fellows violently beat the inmates, and not finding either money or arms, and not finding either a safe or a hiding place, they fired through the roof of the house, threatening Flannery with another visit.

In the neighbourhood of Oakley Park, the seat of the late Mr. Barber, a respectable farmer named Barber (having been in a farm which has been set under the name of another man) was obliged to pay the rent due, and in consequence of his offence he has had his offices burnt down, and on Thursday night his son was fired at through a fence. The young lad escaped to a neighbouring house, and was wounded in the leg. Mr. Duncan, the Sub-Commissioner, proceeded by himself, to avoid suspicion, and having had a description of the man who fired, went to the house and immediately arrested and handed him over to the custody of the police party at the next station.
