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The Right Rev. Dr. Ryan has given to the Christian Brothers £10, towards clothing their poor children, which they gratefully acknowledge.
The sermon at St. Michael's Chapel on Sunday by Rev. Mr. O'Brien, of Cork, for the Presentation Convent poor school, was followed by a collection of £76.
Meanus new Chapel, of which Lord Guillamore laid the foundation, was opened for worship on Sunday last by the Very Rev. R. Cussen, P.P. of Bruff.
The parish of Ballinamore, Leitrim, vacant by the death of that clever controversialist, Father Tom. Maguire, is in the gift of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Kilmore, Dr. J. Browne. After the celebrated controversy with the Rev. Dr. Pope, in 1827, Father Maguire was persuaded to attend the memorable Clare election in 1828, to exert his influence for Mr O'Connell's return to Parliament. He was nephew to the late Right Rev. Dr. Maguire, Bishop of Kilmore, and was from his infancy destined for the church. He received his education for the church at Maynooth College.
The Very Rev Dr Keenan, P.P., and Vicar General of Dromore, who was suspended for alleged contumacy or disobedience to the Right Rev. Dr. Blake, died the week before last of fever at Rome, where he went to implore redress.
The recent attacks in Parliament on the Roman Catholic clergy have provoked much displeasure in that body. Archbishop M'Hale has published their vindication in a long letter, addressed to Lord John Russell. "Allow me," says the Archbishop, "to assure your lordship, that were any clergyman found so to abuse his ministry as to excite any of his flock to any crime whatever, so surely would he be suspended from his sacred functions, and visited with the heaviest censures of the church."
The Right Rev. Dr. M'Nicholas has made the following changes among the curates of Achonry:—Rev. Patrick R. Roddy has been promoted from Mulneelreena to Ballaghadareen; Rev. Mark Healy changed from Ballisodare to Kilmance, and succeeded by the Rev. P. Groarke, of Kilmance.
Two Chapels, in Cavan, were robbed of crucifixes and altar paintings, last week.
The Rev. Dr. Renahan, President of Maynooth College, is elected a member of the Council of the Irish Archaeological Society, in the room of the late Professor M'Cullagh.
On Tuesday night, some persons unknown broke the windows of the Roman Catholic chapel in Listry, Kerry, and stripped it of all its coverings, tore the altar cloths, trampled the mass book in the mire, and after breaking the chalice, tearing the vestment and other robes, folded them together, brought them to Milltown, and threw them over the wall, into the convent yard. They also broke every vessel that was in the chapel.
The Roman Catholics of Loughmore and Mungret contributed £20 15s for Mr O'Connell's monument, which was remitted to Dublin per Rev Mr D'Arcy, PP.
THE DUBLIN UNIVERSITY MAGAZINE for the present month contains a highly interesting memoir of the life of the late Right Hon. John Fitzgibbon, Earl of Clare, from the period of his being called to the bar in 1772 to that of his death in 1802. Barry, Yelverton, Lysaght, and Harry Grady are noticed among his contemporaries, and the other "bright particular stars" of the time. Although comparatively inexperienced, Lord Clare's known abilities had given him a sort of brevet rank amongst the public men of his day. His mind was eminently legal, his power of continuous and vigorous application immense; his judgment was clear and rapid, and he thus readily overmastered any professional difficulties with which he had to contend. He saw the form of a Government without the power—an ostensible ministry—a puppet administration; a Parliament to all outward seeming without any of the functions of a legislature; and he but aimed at giving a substantial reality to what had only mocked the lovers of liberty as a hollow semblage of the British constitution. Several letters of a highly complimentary character are quoted in the memoir; one from the Duke of Rutland, the then Lord Lieutenant; another from Lord Thurlow, the English Chancellor; and one from William Pitt, himself, reflecting the greatest credit on the Irish Chancellor.
The other papers of interest in the Magazine are one on the subject of "Napoleon," and the continuation of the article "Irish Rivers." The latter, from the pen of Dr. Wilde, of Dublin, and Dr. Kidd, of this city, we are glad to perceive are likely soon to see the light in the shape of two interesting volumes.
