succeeded in capturing two of the party, namely Martin Molony, and a man named Cunningham; but owing to the darkness of the night, the rest escaped. However, George Magrath, of Liscallane, a man named King, Molony, (brother of the above named Martin) and Dugan, son of a woodranger, have been all identified, and committed to gaol. These were the party who lately broke into the house and robbed William Molony, of Garrura, Esq., and took money, plate, watches, and jewellery, which have since their arrest been discovered, and partly restored. They were also taken up for firing at William F Reade, Esq. about a month ago, on his way home from Henry Bolton's, Esq. where he dined, and whom they wounded in the head, but not severely. It is hoped the capture of this gang will tend to the quietening of that part of the country, which has been in a state of siege for the last few months.

Sunday afternoon whilst the Rev. Mr. Pennefather, rector of Tullyallen, near Drogheda, with his household, were at Divine service, his residence, at Mellifont glebe, was entered by robbers. There was no person in charge of the premises but a small boy, who was terrified by the ruffians presenting a gun, and threatening to shoot him if he made any noise. They then opened all the desks by force, and succeeded in discovering £42 17s in cash, which they carried off.

Some ruffians with stones, broke several squares of glass in the windows of the Rev. George Burkit, at Cree, within a few miles of Birr, on Friday night. This is a bad return for the Rev. gentleman's indefatigable, and unceasing exertions to relieve the wants of the distressed, in his parish, during the past and present season.

Monday night three sheep the property of James F. Rolleston, of Frankford Castle, Esq., King's County, were killed on his lands, and the carcasses taken away.

The arms taken from Moore Hall, Mayo, the seat of Mr. Brown, M P, a few nights ago by a band of fellows, have been returned, through the exertions of the Rev. Mr. Conway, R C C of Partry.

John O'Donnell, Lord Lucan's bailiff, near Castlebar, whom the Dublin press murdered, is alive and well, not having been fired at or wounded.

John Minton, aged 12 years, was killed at Dovegrove, King's county, on Friday, by a lad named Kennedy, who took up the gun of a caretaker and fired it, not supposing it loaded.

A young man named Giles Pole, in the employment of a miller in Roscrea, was knocked down in that town on Wednesday night, as he was going to the Post-office and robbed of £30.
