

Pauper destitution makes such awful strides in Ennis union, that the guardians resolve in future to meet from day to day until all cases of destitution brought before them are disposed of.

The Ennistymon guardians have taken the responsibility of giving out door relief to all paupers, until additional workhouse accommodation is provided.

The following appeared in part of last impression:

The Chief Justice Blackburne, and Chief Baron Pigot, are deputed to hold SPECIAL COMMISSIONS at Limerick, Ennis, and Nenagh, and it is expected the court will be opened at Limerick on Monday, 3d January next.

The particulars connected with the recent murder of the late Mr. Ralph Hill, at Rathurd, near this City, were fully investigated, and all necessary witnesses examined at the office of the Crown Solicitor on Monday, with the view of making the parties in custody amenable to justice at the special Commission.

Saturday night last seventeen panes of glass in the windows of Mungret church were maliciously broken, and next morning the Rev. Thomas Westropp and congregation observed in the interior of the edifice the small stones and slate with which this diabolical outrage was committed. Rev. Mr. Westropp by his indefatigable exertion last year raised a fund of £300, which he distributed gratis to the suffering poor in that district and devoted himself, regardless of other calls, to the relief of every destitute person. This last has been the third outrage recently committed upon his domestic establishment, and on his parish church.

The house of Michael Kelly, a shoemaker, residing near Fedamore, was attacked by armed men on Sunday night, who carried off a pair of shoes.

Five sheep the property of James Connors, of Caherlevoy, were stolen on Monday night.

Several farm houses in the district of Killeedy, near Newcastle, were attacked by armed men on Monday night, in search of money.

On Sunday night a sheep the property of David Kelly, of Boulavourd, near Fedamore, was killed and the flesh taken away.

A man named William Kelly, who went to steal sheep, the property of the Rev. Mr. Lloyd, at Portward near Cappamore, was killed on Monday night, by two men who were in charge of the field upon which they were grazing. James Bennett, Esq., coroner, held an inquest yesterday, when it appeared that Kelly died of a bayonet wound in the breast. The coroner committed James Bray and Michael Kane for the homicide.

Serjeant Riedy yesterday arrested Garrett Shaughnessy, in Mary-street, in whose possession he found a firkin of butter which had been stolen at the steam-boat quay, from Patt O'Connor, of Carrig Island. Informations were sworn against the offender.

Thomas Bourke, who was arrested by Sub-Constable Menagh, for stealing lead from Mr. Harvey's concerns, Bedford-row, has been committed to prison.

At the Magistrates office this day, Margaret Glyn and John Hartigan, were sentenced to a fortnight's imprisonment for begging in the streets; Timothy Fitzpatrick, of Ennis, who was arrested by Mr. Sheils, Inspector of night watch, in a state of drunkenness in a brothel in Post-office lane, with £1 8s in his possession, was fined 5s. or 48 hours imprisonment.
