### MURDER OF THOMAS MURPHY.

#### FURTHER PARTICULARS.

On Thursday night last, a most cold-blooded murder  
was committed on the lands of Lodge, the estate of the  
Earl of Kenmare, near Hospital, in this county. The  
unfortunate victim, Thomas Murphy, was a most res-  
pectable farmer, and a very intelligent, well-educated  
man. As early as half-past six o'clock in the evening,  
Murphy's servant maid went out of the house to bring  
some turf, three armed men rushed in, and after being  
there about a quarter of an hour, and taking all the  
money they could find (£36), one of the party out-  
side called to the man who was standing next to  
Murphy to "do his duty," upon which the miscreant  
turned round, put a pistol close to Murphy's breast, and  
fired. The contents lodged in his chest and lungs.  
Murphy survived in great agony until Saturday morn-  
ing, when he died. No excuse can be assigned  
for this murder, as Murphy was a most respect-  
able farmer, and much liked in his neighbourhood.  
It was known that he was to come next day to  
this city to pay his rent. The unfortunate  
victim has left a young wife and six children, the eldest  
seven years old to deplore his loss. Not more than  
three men entered the house—but it is supposed that  
more men were outside. The money was kept by  
Murphy in a bottle in the thatched roof of his house,  
and the servant man in the house, and who is at pre-  
sent in custody, is strongly suspected of knowing where  
the money was, and giving the party who entered the  
house intimation of it. At the post mortem examina-  
tion, by Samuel Bennett, Esq., a quantity of large shot  
was found in the chest and lungs of Murphy. Verdict  
at the inquest—wilful murder against persons unknown.

The Lord Lieutenant has offered a reward of £100,  
for apprehension of the murderers of the late Thomas  
Murphy, of Lodge, near Hospital. Leahy is the name  
of the servant man in custody on suspicion.

Monday last a threatening notice was received thro'  
the post, by John Mahon, Esq. of Thornville, in which

brother, the late Major Mahon, of Strokestown.
