

The day Police were sentenced to a months imprisonment each—Patrick Hill; Thomas Riley, Philip Dea, James M'Donnell, and John Collins; Dea, was sentenced to a week's imprisonment for having a gambling table in the street. Informations were ordered against Bridget Coffee, for assault on Mary M'Mahon; against Zachariah Holland for rescuing himself from Morty Sweeney, by whom he was arrested under a civil bill decree; against George Dea, charged by Mr. Shiel with keeping a brothel; against Henry O'Neill for rescuing himself from Charley M'Mahon; Anne Carmody and Denis Buckley were sentenced to 15s. each for drunkenness; twenty persons summoned by the Inspector of nuisances appointed by the committee, were fined in mitigated penalties, varying from 1s to 2s 6d and costs.

THE ARMS ACT.—Several the Magistrates at Petty Sessions yesterday, before farmers were summoned by the Police, for having old fire-arms in their possession. Those who were worthless and unfit for use, the court ordered informations, according to the statute, to be laid against the parties implicated were ordered to find bail for their appearance at the ensuing assizes.

At the County Petty Sessions yesterday the Magistrates privately investigated a charge of rape, made by a female named Anne Crowley, of Plassy, against John Nunn, a servant man—informations were ordered against the accused.

The county Clare grand jury have presented £14260, a sum made by the Board of Works for roads, with a memorial to Government that the amount should not be levied until after summer assizes.

Deputies Ball and Moore intend to investigate the applications for compensation for land taken or injured on roads, under the Board of Works operations, on Wednesday next, at Ennis.

At Waterford Assizes on Wednesday an action was commenced in which Robert Rodger, Esq. of this city, was plaintiff, and Mr. Cole, ship agent of that city, defendant, to recover a sum of £12, being the amount of commission on freights of the ship *Maria Brennan*, the property of the plaintiff. There was a verdict for the defendant, with costs.

150 labourers on the estate of the Knight of Glin, and most considerably devoted his land for the object of giving them employment under the Drainage Act, he being idle this week, owing to some novel stringent regulations adopted by the Commissioners.

A considerable quantity of ground is being prepared in this county and the county Clare for sowing potatoes; which are expected to be an abundant crop the ensuing season. The "Gold finders" are the favourite talents for seed, owing to their great produce, it having been ascertained that one barrel sown will yield twenty. Mr. John Cavanagh, of Patrick's-well, had 300 barrels on five acres last year, without blight, and retained the entire for seed this spring.

Much anxiety is evinced by the labouring population, and small farmers of this and the adjoining counties to emigrate to America this present spring, but in consequence of an anticipation that the restrictive bill introduced by the Government will soon become law, ship agents and agents in this city are obliged to charge £5 each adult passenger—a sum which hundreds cannot afford—and, therefore, few berths have been engaged in vessels announced to sail from this port.

The second Promenade Concert at the Philosophical Rooms, on Thursday night, was respectfully attended. A vocal choir greatly enhanced the entertainment, and a beautiful band of the 92d played occasional pieces.

ENNIS UNION.—Mr. Cronin, Inspector submitted a report to the board on Wednesday, a reply from the Commissioners to a notice of motion by Mr. Singleton, that the board should call upon the Commissioners to accept of the resignations and appoint paid Guardians in their stead. The Commissioners were unwilling to supersede the Ennis guardians, unless in case of absolute necessity. Mr. Cronin expressed a hope that the vice-chairman, James Burke Butler, Esq. who had intimated his intention of resigning, if the guardians did not co-operate with him in general, would continue to give his valuable services to the union, and that there would be a general operation of the Board with him. Mr. John MacBeth was declared contractor for 6 months to supply Indian meal at £8 18s per ton, Mr. John Shaw oatmeal, at £11 15s. per ton.

The Tralee union is divided into two electoral divisions, namely, Tralee and Dingle.

There are 8000 destitute in the new union of Dingle. Joseph Faucett, one of a respectable family, died on a road of starvation, at Portland, Birr union. Foy's late hotel, at Castlebar, now a temporary workhouse, is full of fever, a very unpleasant visitation on the eve of the assizes.

The wife and two sons of Mr. Murray, clerk of Casbar church, died of fever in the last few days, and the eldest son is despaired off in the same malady.

THE HERO OF ALIWAL AND THE 27TH INNISKILLINGS.

Sir Harry Smith arrived at Grahamstown on the 18th Dec. A guard of honour, consisting of Lieuts. Midgley, Manly, and Pakenham, and 100 rank and file of the 27th Regiment, under command of Captain Vereker, were drawn up in front of the Governor's house. His Excellency having received the usual honors, addressed the regiment in the following terms:—

"Inniskillings, my old comrades, I rejoice to see you, especially as I now see you—soldiers in every sense of the words. You are as valiant in the field as in quarters your conduct is exemplary and inimitable. You are an honour to your Queen and the country you come from. Your period of service is now expired; and I will not keep you from your native land one moment longer than I can help; for, much as I love the British soldier, I revere the old 27th." At the conclusion of the address, the Inniskillings took off their caps and loudly cheered his Excellency.

The 1st Battalion 12th Regt. under Lieut.-Colonel Patton, arrived from the Mauritius at Portsmouth on Wednesday night, by the *Resistance* troop ship.

To-morrow will be the anniversary of the battle of Barossa, in 1811, where the Grenadier, Coldstream, and Scotch Fusileer Guards, 28th, 67th, 87th and Rifle Brigade, achieved a splendid victory over the French army.

Tuesday the detachments of the 74th Highlanders and 95th being reduced, 90 privates arrived in Dublin.

The 9th and 62d are confined to barracks at Winchester during the assizes, but the officers have provided various athletic exercises and amusement for the men.

Lieut.-Generals Pollock and Cleiland, both of the East India Company's service, died in London this week.

Captain Guerin, late commanding a company in the Guernsey Militia, who was removed by the late Governor, Sir Charles Napier, has been restored by his successor, Major-General Bell. The officers and subalterns, now serving in the ranks, will also be restored to their commissions.

Thomas Shairp, jun., Esq., is appointed to a company in the Berwick Militia, vice J. Pringle, promoted to a Majority.

In the year 1829 there were 1,157 commissioned officers of the Irish yeomanry, 35,258 non-commissioned officers and men. The Yeomanry were disbanded on the 31st of March, 1834.
