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soon re-appear at the Park theatre, &c.
We have the satisfaction to state, in reference to
Mr. Marshall's auction of horses on Saturday last, at
the Repository in this City, that he never sold more
horses at any similar sale here. All Mr. Hartigan's
horses were sold with the exception of one; and out
of 104 entries in catalogue, he actually sold 69. This
month's sale is admitted by all to be a great boon to
persons anxious to sell horses, and those who went
to purchase equally acknowledge the convenience of it.

The following appeared in part of last impression:

A petition from the Provost and Fellows of Trinity
College in behalf of Mr. S O'Brien, was yesterday for-
warded to the Queen.

Since his conviction, no one is allowed to visit Mr.
Smith O'Brien, except wife, mother, and brothers.

Terence Bernard M'Manus, the Liverpool broker, was
found guilty of high treason on Thursday last at Clon-
mel Commission, and recommended to mercy.

Francis Butler, of the 6th Dragoon Guards, was
killed on Thursday night, at the terminus of the
Drogheda railway.

There is no truth in the report of Mr. Sadlier, who
served on the jury of Mr. S. O'Brien, having been
assassinated.

This day, Doctor Enright held an inquest on
the body of a female, named Margaret Meagher,
who died suddenly in a grocer's shop in Denmark-
street, from drinking to excess of ardent spirits. The
same Coroner has, within the last few weeks, held
inquests on eight persons, that died under similar cir-
cumstances, and who were known to have been
pledge-breakers.

Though the magistrates and police have been un-
wearied in their exertions to discover the murderers of
the three bailiffs put in charge of property seized for
poor rates near Bansha, no success has as yet attended
their efforts.
