

that the entire system will undergo extensive alterations. Attention is in the first place devoted to equalizing the unions in respect to amount of valuation, as it is intended to propose to Parliament to make the establishment charges of all the unions a uniform and general tax throughout the country, the paupers to be supported by their electoral divisions as at present.—Every effort will also be made to bring the union under one uniform system of management, and devise such a system of supervision as will prevent the jobbing by contractors which is so injurious to the interests of the rate-payers.—*Cork Constitution.*

The Cork guardians on a division of 34 to four resolved against having a second union in that city. Mr. Swiney, master of the Cork workhouse, has resigned his situation.

From Ennis Workhouse 300 paupers were transferred this week to the out-door relief list, and as many applicants taken in. The Guardians are taking 25 acres of land adjoining the workhouse. Mr. Whitstone, jun., is fitting up Mr. R. Scott's store, at Clare, for additional workhouse accommodation.

In the Mohill union, county Leitrim, administered by vice guardians, a rate averaging 3s 3d in the pound is collected at the rate of £500 per week without the aid of Police or attorney, at a cost of 1s in the pound, collector's fees.

The Cork union have lost considerable sum by giving employ to the inmates, the work so carelessly executed gave no encouragement to purchasers. The guardians are about to purchase a mill to be worked by manual labour of the paupers.

THIRD DEATH FROM HUNGER IN THE PARISH OF BALLINGARRY

On Thursday, the 16th inst., John Cox, Esq., Coroner, held an inquest at Ballygrennan Commons, in the parish of Ballingarry, on the body of Bartholomew Roche. The jury, with the full concurrence, and, indeed, by direction of the coroner returned their unanimous verdict—"Died of hunger." The widow of deceased, who lay on straw, within a foot of the body of her husband (after having been within an hour disposed for death by Rev. William O'Donnell, the Roman Catholic curate of the parish), in feeble and dying accents, and in the Irish language, deposed as follows: Margaret Roche sworn—Deposed that her family consisted of her deceased husband, herself, and two children, of the age of 12 and 15 years; that she has an elder son married, Edmond Roche, aged about 22; that this young man works among the farmers at thrashing and other farm labour, receiving in lieu of his labour his food merely—wages being out of the question; that, for the last fortnight or three weeks, her son worked for Patrick Collins, of Ballyclare, farmer; that, on Sunday, the 29th of October, he procured for the family at home, viz.—his father, mother, brother, and sister, one stone of Indian meal which lasted them for about two days; that, from that time to the death of her husband, the family lived on turnips, given by the charity of Patrick Collins, and on some cabbage leaves from their own garden; (the turnips given by Collins—the last he had—were of the white unsubstantial kind, but she said that Mr. Crimmon, of Killatal, gave them a meal of two of good Swedish turnips) on the very day on which her husband died her son, Edmond, procured a shilling, viz.—the expence of an old debt, and six pence, the gift of Patk. Collins; this shilling he converted at once into Indian meal (about 10lbs.); she hastened to make stirabout, but before it could be prepared her husband had breathed his last! This horrid tale was corroborated by other witnesses, indeed, was well-known to most of the jury, who returned a verdict accordingly.

There is a very poor supply of Indian meal in Dingle at present. Nearly 1,200 persons are receiving in-door relief in the temporary workhouses of the union. Out-door relief is being issued to 3,700.
