at the Ennis Board of Guardians.

There are now two Poor Law Inspectors at Ennis viz., Captain Kennedy, and Col. Vaughan Jackson.

Captain Routh, 23d Fusiliers, is in fever, taken on duty as Poor Law Inspector of Newcastle, in this county.

Surgeon Whitestone, of Ennis, is recovering from the severe fever which he caught while medical officer of the Scariff union.

The Irish Boards of Guardians are invited to send delegates to a general meeting to be held the 19th inst. in Dublin, to petition for an amendment of the Poor Laws, upon remedies there to be suggested. The Kells union has originated the subject.

The mastership of Ennistymon workhouse is vacant by the death of Mr. Michael Morony, formerly clerk in the Provincial Bank, who fell a victim to fever, of which there are 300 cases in the workhouse hospital.

There are 5000 paupers in Cork workhouse.

THREE DEATHS OF STARVATION AND COLD.

On Tuesday, Ellen O'Connor and her daughter, Honora, aged 10 years, were found dead on the hilf of Billaugh, electoral division of Killeedy, in the Newcastle union. In Springfield church, an inquest was subsequently held by John Cox, Esq. coroner, when the bodies were exhumed, and a post-mortem examination by Geo. Bolster, Esq., M.D. There was nothing found in the stomach of Ellen O'Connor, but in the daughter's there was found a small portion of Indian meal or stirabout, but not considered sufficient to sustain existence. The jury returned a verdict of "Died by the visitation of God, on being exposed to the inclemency of the weather."

Mr. Cox, coroner, held an inquest on the body of a man named Keleher, who was found dying on the road side near Abbeyfeale. The jury did not return their verdict, until a post-mortem examination took place by Dr. Ambrose, when the jury returned a verdict "Died by starvation and inanition." It is to be feared that before the winter is over, there will be several cases of this awful nature occurring in the neighbourhood, and many may never come before the public eye.

Catherine Doran died of starvation at Bealmullen, near Athlone, on Tuesday, as appeared by the inquest.

The infant daughter of a distressed poor woman named Mary Halloran, who had been recently discharged from the fever hospital, died in its mother's arms, in the streets on Monday, and the Magistrates ordered a coffin for interment of the body.

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
