CANTEENS.—Lord Cardigan, Lt.-Col. of the 11th Hussars, in reply to the Horse Guards circular, as to the efficacy of the new system, replies:—"My opinion is, that no real benefit, either as regards health or habits of the soldiers, has been gained by prohibiting the sale of spirits in regimental canteens; and I am further of opinion that it tends to induce the soldiers to resort to the public-houses in the neighbourhood where spirits are sold, and the men are thus thrown more into the society of the civilians. Crimes resulting from drunkenness have not decreased since the introduction of the new system, and the medical officer has found no difference in the health of the men."

The death of General Sir Hector Maclean, in his 93d year, places General Tredway Clarke, of the Madras Artillery, at the head of the Indian Army, he having entered the service of the Company in 1799. He is the only officer in that service holding the rank of General.

It is remarkable that the nephew of the man against whom the British Army were employed for a series of years, should not only be an associate of the officers of this country, but held in high estimation by them.

Commander James J. M' Cleverty, (1842) in command of the Polyphemus steam sloop, at Gibraltar, is promoted to the rank of Captain, for on the coast of Morocco, rescuing the "Three Sisters" from pirates. Lieut. Gardner who was wounded in bringing off the Brig is promoted to the Rank of Commandeur.

ENNIS UNION.

An order was received from the Commissioners of Health calling upon the Board to elect four Physicians to the Fever Hospital on the 10th instant.

Mr. John O'Brien, M.P., gave notice of the following resolutions, for reference to a committee, to be embodied in the petition already adopted:—

"Resolved—That in conformity with the undeniable principle that "The property of the country should be responsible for the support of its poverty," we hold there should be a national contribution to each locality of one-half the poor rate assessment, the other half to be defrayed by the district, thereby securing a just contribution from the various classes of property and coincidentally with it that economy and efficient co-operation, the result of a limited local taxation. That the construction, repair, and maintenance of roads should be placed in the hands of the Guardians of the respective unions, thereby securing their better and more economical execution, affording a remunerative application of pauper labor and a valuable test of destitution. That it would be expedient, when practicable that the rate payer of each electoral division should have claim, in proportion to his poor rate assessment upon the pauper labor of his district, when such shall not be otherwise applied to purposes of public utility. That while to the industrious tenant every encouragement should be afforded whether by increased security of tenure, or by liberal compensation for substantial improvements, so should increased facilities be at the same time given to the landlord for the recovery of his rent or the possession of his property, and thus protect him from the aggravated loss, and the country from the prejudicial consequences of insolvent and overholding tenants. That it is contrary to equitable principle that the county cess should fall exclusively upon the occupier of land and that, such should be paid as poor rate assessment."

Ennis Fever-Hospital contains 250 beds, and the sheds will contain 60 more, when completed. A representation is made to the Lord Lieutenant, explaining the inability of Ennis to support the Hospital without extrinsic aid.

A pauper named Driscoll, died of starvation at Ballyheige, and there is a verdict of manslaughter against the relieving officer of Tralee union.

Mr. Glynn, Poor-rate collector, was accompanied on Wednesday last, by Francis Davys, Esq. Stipendiary Magistrate, from the New-quay, with a large constabulary force, under T. Macmahon, J.P., while enforcing the payment of Poor-rate in the district of Ballindureen, county Galway.

Mr. W. C. Cooper, a Guardian of Carlow union, says that many Irish gentlemen who received loans for the improvement of their properties by the employment of the labouring classes, have put the money into their pockets.
